Mr. and Mrs. Amasa M. Hammon of Adrian Bench will celebrate their golden wedding anniversary at a party Friday evening, at 8:30 in the Owyhee Ward hall. All friends and relatives are invited to attend.

Mr. Hammon and the former Edith Hobson were married Nov. 22, 1905 in the LDS temple in Salt Lake City. They resided the first 40 years of their married life in Roy and Ogden, Utah, coming to Nyssa community in March, 1945. They first lived on a farm near the present Dale Garrison ranch, moving a short time later to their present place on Adrian Bench.

Mr. and Mrs. Hammon have both been very active in church and civic affairs. He served as the first president of the Malheur County Farm Bureau when it was formed about 10 years ago and has been active in Farm Bureau work since 1916. He was also a member of the planning board for construction of the Malheur Memorial hospital.

Among their many outstanding activities during the years were Mr. Hammon's serving a two year mission for the LDS church beginning Jan. 10, 1906, his serving in the Sunday school superintendency in Roy ward, Weber county, president of the Mutual Improvement association several years, bishop of Roy ward for seven and one-half years, from Feb. 20, 1924, and president of the Elders' Quorum.

Mr. Hammon's community activities included county commissioner of Weber county four years, sheriff of Weber county four years and many years of directing and coaching baseball and other sports. He followed construction work for 25 years in Utah, Idaho, Nebraska, Nevada, Colorado and California and during World War II worked for the U.S. government as one of the foremen for construction of runways and other projects.

Mrs. Hammon served in the M.I.A. presidency and as president of the primary and also the Relief society in Roy ward.

They have nine children, two sons, Amasa M. Hammon, Jr. and Levi D. Hammon who reside near Nyssa and seven daughters, Edith Lauder, Rupert, Ida; Mildred Burningham and Ruth Owens of Clearfield, Utah; Lamar Carver, Plain City, Utah; Myrta Rondquist of Roy and Wilma "Billy" Capp and Lavina Langford, both of Ogden. They also have 37 grandchildren and six great grandchildren.
