From the Journal Files

10 Years Ago—Oct. 25, 1945

Lettuce packing operations at the J. C. Watson packing shed in Nyssa were back to normal following a two day strike at the plant. . . . Forty-five men attended the brotherhood of the Methodist church held in the Nyssa church with Dr. K. E. Kerby as speaker. . . . Mr. and Mrs. Carl Burningham will open Carl's Doll House on west Main Saturday. . . . Mrs. Hilda Tensen has resigned as member of the Malheur county welfare commission after serving for a period of 8 years. . . . Ira Ure of Nyssa has purchased five lots at Main and Fourth streets and will erect a large building on the property and lease it to the International Harvester company. . . . The Idaho Canning company has purchased 20 acres of land on the old Felton farm northeast of Nyssa and expects to establish a canning factory on the site next year for the processing of sweet corn. The unit will employ from 400 to 425 persons during the season.

15 Years Ago—Oct. 24, 1940

The irrigating season will end tomorrow with the turning off of water from the Owyhee dam, according to George Haycock, watermaster. . . . 20 Years Ago—Oct. 24, 1935

The First National Bank of Portland will establish a branch bank at Nyssa Nov. 2, E. B. MacNaught, president announced. The new branch will be housed in the building formerly occupied by the Malheur County Bank. Nyssa has been without a bank since 1932 and the building has been used for some of the city departments. The city officers will be moved to the Owyhee Irrigation office. . . . The mercury dropped to 14 degrees above Wednesday. . . . Fire destroyed the H. E. Ellsworth home on an island in the Snake river south of Nyssa. . . . Homer and Charles Holmes of Ft. Lupton, Colo., who had not seen their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dick Holmes for over 12 years, visited here this week.

25 Years Ago—Oct. 24, 1930

Fifty friends of the Ray Miller family gave them a farewell party. The Millers are moving to Wyoming. . . . 140,000 head of sheep will be wintered near here this winter, due to the nearly perfect climate and plenty of feed. The Mayland family are moving to Kentucky. Fifty-five young people gave them a farewell party. . . . Mr. and Mrs. J. Langston are the new proprietors of the Owyhee club.

35 Years Ago—Oct. 22, 1920

Artie Robertson has purchased the Frank Newbill property on First street. . . . A mass meeting was held at the Liberty Theater Wednesday night for the purpose of discussing the move to close the picture show Sunday evenings. . . . Mrs. O. D. Cole and Mrs. G. A. Irwin returned from a trip to Vancouver, B. C. . . . Leroy Monson of Parma purchased the Nyssa tire shop from Allen & Burns. . . . Spencer Heaton and Claude Shawn returned this week from the harvest belt at Walla Walla.

45 Years Ago—Oct. 20, 1910

Nyssa captured first prize for the best community display of fruit at the Boise fair. The committee in charge were S. N. Emission, C. C. Wilson, and W. B. Hoxie. . . . The Malheur County Bank is having new cement sidewalks laid on the east and south of their property. . . . Mr. Butcher of Payette purchased the Morrison 20-acre tract for \$4500. . . . Work to clean and enlarge the Owyhee ditch will soon begin—many men and teams are wanted. . . . J. A. Ward, John Ray, W. L. Gibson and John Bigelow attended a directors meeting of the Owyhee Ditch Co., in Ontario Tuesday.

Former OSS Man Speaks at Dec. 5 K and F Meeting

Arch F. Coleman, a former office of strategic service man, will be guest speaker at the next meeting of the Malheur county Knife and Fork club Monday evening, Dec. 5, at the East Side cafe in Ontario.

Coleman, who did valiant work in Mexico, Central America and in the Far East during World War II as an OSS man, is now a public relations counselor in North Carolina.

A graduate of the University of Minnesota after spending two years at West Point, he obtained his foreign experience through private business when he accepted a clerical job with a fruit company in Guatemala, Central America. Later he worked for an oil company in Mexico and was then employed by the U.S. government as an assistant trade commissioner in Mexico City. With this foreign service background, he was sent to Mexico to spy out the extent of the Gestapo and Japanese intelligence services.

Coleman was an instructor in espionage work and during World War II established and organized espionage groups working out of Istanbul.

COUNTY LIBRARY

New fiction and readable non-fiction are prominent in the group of books going into circulation on Saturday, Nov. 12, at the Malheur County Library.

Bruce Siberts came to South Dakota in the 1890's and moved to Oklahoma in 1906. His ranching experiences with blizzards, rustlers, and rowdy companionship are recounted in Nothing but Prairie and Sky.

Castle Garac by Nicholas Monsarrat is a novel of adventure in which an impoverished American on the Riviera undertakes mysterious employment.

Lionel Shapiro's novel, The Sixth of June, concerns the love of two people whose loyalties lay elsewhere, and is set against the backdrop of World War II in England prior to D-day.

Three Men by Jean Evans contains psychological case studies of three misfits whose lives as reported by the author are "an experiment in the biography of emotion."

The Plums Hang High by Gert-rude Finney is a novel about the struggle of a young English couple that arrived in the mid-west farm country in 1868 to make their home.

Murray Morgan writes of trees as tall as skyscrapers, salmon as big as month-old calves, lumber barons, and stump ranchers in The Last Wilderness, the Olympic peninsula.

John Rivers sets the record straight about Henry Maarten, the great man he has known, as he talks with a friend one Christmas Eve, in Aldous Huxley's new novel The Genius and the Goddess.

A collection of western adventure short stories by Harry Sinclair Drago is Their Guns Were Fast.

Using the question-and-answer method, Alan Swallow gives helpful advice to The Beginning Writer.

The Complete Book of Interior Decorating by Mary Derieux and Isabelle Stevenson discusses traditional and modern furniture, includes a section on decorating for music, TV, and hi-fi, and displays photographs of actual interiors.

Great River; the Rio Grande in American History by Paul Horgan tells the history of not only the river but an entire region, in two volumes: "Indians and Spain," and "Mexico and the United States."

CARS ARE MY LINE

One thing that makes us especially proud is the number of people who buy their first used car from us, let us service it, and then as they move up, come back to buy newer cars from us.

Servicing by good mechanics is the most important single point in preserving the value of a car. But there is so much an owner can do himself to get more mileage and more dollars out of his car.

Take the simple little matter of keeping tires properly inflated.

Tires that are overinflated wear out quickly in the middle of the tread; underinflation is just as bad. It brings overheating which causes the layers of fabric inside the tire to separate.

Wandering and weaving on the road can be caused by underinflation, and a pull to one side can result from unequal inflation on the front tires or from not having matched treads. Underinflated tires can cause a shimmy, too.

All this worry can be saved by nothing more complicated than checking your tire pressure. When you've been running around town, pressure should be no more than three pounds above the recommended cold pressure; on the open highway five pounds above is all right.

These are the important little things you'll learn by talking to the people on our lot and in our service department. When something really goes wrong, those mechanics have the machinery and the know how to fix it. But like any good doctor, when nothing is really wrong, they'll tell you.
