The first annual art exhibit of the Ontario art association and the Vale art club will open Friday evening at 7 p.m. in the lobby of the First National Bank of Ontario. The show will continue until Dec. 12 in the lobby of both the First National and the U. S. National banks.

A special musical program will be furnished on the opening night by Byron Jensen at the console of the organ.

On Dec. 12 the show will be moved to the Community center in Vale for one week, after which it may be moved to Nyssa for a week's showing at a location to be announced later. Several Nyssa artists are exhibiting in the show.

Efforts are being made to organize an art association in Nyssa and announcement of an organizational meeting will be made within the next week. Purpose of the association is to make available expert instruction in the visual arts to persons of all ages from 14 years on up and to create more interest in the arts in the community. Both advanced and beginners classes in oils, charcoal, water colors and commercial art are conducted every Thursday evening at 7:30 in the Ontario High school for art association members. Instructors are Miss Connie Conway, Ontario senior high art instructor, Roger Ashby, junior high instructor and Mrs. Anna Markham, professional artist of Ontario.

Justice Court Has Many Jury Cases on Docket

A charge against Leslie L. Matheny for allegedly making a false application for trapper's license was dismissed this week by the Nyssa justice court upon the recommendation of District Attorney E. Otis Smith. Justice Don M. Graham said that the district attorney ruled that regardless of previous residence here, anyone can become a resident as soon as he established his home insofar as becoming a trapper was concerned. Matheny had pleaded not guilty and had asked for a jury trial.

Another pending jury case for the district court is that of Kenneth H. Mace, who appeared in justice court last Saturday and entered a not guilty plea to passing another vehicle at an intersection.

George R. Brown, Nampa, has asked for a jury trial following charges last Friday that he was following another vehicle too close while operating a cattle truck and trailer.

Judge Graham said that his court has had the largest number of jury trials on the docket of any one period for many years.

Committee Set To Study School Finance Problem

Other subjects are district organization, teacher supply and economic welfare.

Appointed as members of the finance committee by Zobell were Ernest Adams and Emil Maag, Vale; John Molthan, Ironside; Jim McDonald, Beulah; Dyer Bennett, Ontario; Warner Peutz, Adrian, and Oren Raburn, Jordan Valley.

The first meeting of the finance committee was scheduled to begin this morning at 9 a.m. at the courthouse in Vale. The group will study the school financial picture in the county as related to Oregon and will study state aid, federal aid, state and county equalization, transportation and building aid.
