\$1,337,000. The total for the county was \$4,765,000.

Food, Auto Sales High

Nyssa's food stores did nearly 30 percent of all business in the county with a grand total of \$1,391,000 as compared with the county-wide total of \$4,712,000 and Ontario's \$2,290,000.

Each local automotive dealer in Nyssa averaged nearly \$60,000 more in sales than did those in Ontario during the year. Here, four dealers reported sales amounting to \$1,151,000 while Ontario's 11 dealers reported sales of only \$2,506,000. There were 13 dealers reported in the county with total sales of \$4,673,000.

Gasoline service stations also averaged more business with seven in Nyssa reporting sales of \$497,000 and 11 of them in Ontario reporting \$548,000. The county had a total of 39 stations with retail sales amounting to \$2,001,000.

Eating establishments did better in Ontario than they did in Nyssa with Ontario's total listed as 21 doing a total of \$799,000 worth of business as compared with 11 here doing \$311,000. Ontario's average was nearly \$10,000 per year more.

In the general merchandise

group, Nyssa and Ontario each was listed with four stores. Nyssa's total sales were \$503,000 and Ontario's were \$738,000. County totals were \$2,183,000. Figures were incomplete for another group listed as apparel and accessories stores, because of withheld reports to avoid disclosure.

Discrepancy Noted

Furniture, home furnishings and appliance dealers throughout the county did a \$2,273,000 business during 1954, but definite figures on what each Nyssa and Ontario did are not available because of the method of reporting. In checking with Nyssa and Ontario dealers, an estimate of \$400,000 was arrived at for Nyssa and \$1,400,000 for Ontario. It was definitely established that neither Nyssa's nor Ontario's total retail sales were properly submitted to the Department of Commerce with Nyssa not receiving its full share of the credit. This would affect the overall total, also, with the actual sales being greater than the amount shown in this report.

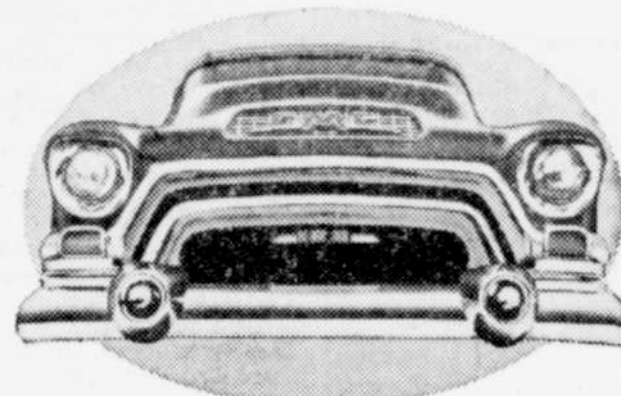
In other types of business, a complete breakdown could not be given, since there were discrepancies in some instances and others figures were withheld because the small number would reveal the amount of individual business. For instance, there was a general merchandise group, apparel and accessories and a list for other stores. Drug stores were grouped with proprietary stores and total sales were not given, although they were included in the overall retail sales.
