COLD WEATHER POULTRY MANAGEMENT TIPS

1. Ventilate house. Let fresh air in without admitting drafts; let moisture-laden air out. If strong ammonia fumes hit you when you open house in the morning, more ventilation is needed.

2. Provide plenty of ice-free water. Automatic electric water warmers available to keep water at 50 degrees or higher. Birds will drink you if forced to drink icy water.

3. Cull old hens carefully. Research shows it doesn't pay to hold over heavy breeds and not more than 25% of the Leghorns.

4. Extra light pays. Provide enough light to make a 13 to 14 hours' day; use a 40-watt bulb per 200 sq. feet of floor space morning and evening with a 25-watt bulb at night.

COLOR CLINIC

Green is a transitional color because it is made by combining a warm with a cool primary color — yellow with blue. If there is more yellow the green swings toward the warm group, the more blue predominates the cooler the green is. Violet in the same way, is the link between blue and red. Lavender tones in which violet is mixed with blue are cool; but they take on warmth as the violet is mixed with red to make mulberry. Pure gray is the neutral color made by mixing in equal proportions either black and white, or the three primaries (blue, yellow and red) from which all other colors are made. This makes gray a great harmonizer between other colors because it has something of all of them in it. Various tones of gray are made by varying the proportions of colors used. Gray is usually considered a cool color and "graying" a warm color is said to cool it down. However, gray swings from cool to warm according to the proportions in which the colors are mixed.
