

Nyssa Grabs 2nd Win From Adrian, Forbess 19 Points

The Nyssa Bulldogs made it two in a row over the Adrian Antelopes at Adrian Tuesday night by a 50-34 margin.

Nyssa wasn't able to pull away from the much improved Adrian team until the middle of the fourth quarter.

Early in the second quarter Nyssa lost the services of Doug Lewis, who dislocated his knee. This definitely hurt as far as rebounding strength is concerned. Glen Griffiths came on and replaced Lewis, and Glen did a nice job offensively and defensively.

In the middle of the fourth quarter Nyssa lost their two guards Gerry Leseberg and Bill Low via fouls. Then Frankie Morris and John Messick came on and did an able job to help keep the Bulldogs out in front of the threatening Adrian Antelopes.

Nyssa's offensive attack was led by Dennis Forbes with 19 points, Larry Schenk 15, and Gerry Leseberg 10.

Adrian's offence was led by Price with 10 points and Jim Thompson 8.

On December 27 the Nyssa Bulldogs will journey to Buhl for a non-conference game. Buhl is a member of the Big Seven conference. Buhl journeyed through this part of the state last week and garnered a win from Meridian on Friday night and took a loss from Vale on Saturday night.

The Nyssa Bull Pups beat the Adrian "B" squad by a score of 45-25. The individual scoring for Nyssa was Colman 2 points, Chesnut 10, Burbank 2, Bergam 6, Roberts 10, McWilliams 9, Toombs 4, and Moss 2.

Pink Alaska Pie
10 marshmallows 3 or 4 drops red food coloring
2 tablespoons butter 1 1/2 cups tender-thin
1 tablespoon hot water 1 flaked coconut

Melt marshmallows and butter in top of double boiler, stirring until blended. Add hot water and food coloring, stirring well. Add coconut and mix thoroughly. Spread on bottom and sides of greased 9-inch pie pan. Chill until firm. Serve with pudding or chiffon type pie filling or try Alaskan Filling.

Alaskan Filling
3 egg whites
1/4 teaspoon salt
6 tablespoons sugar
1 pint very firm ice cream (any flavor)

Beat egg whites with salt until foamy. Add sugar gradually and continue beating until meringue mixture will stand in peaks. Pack ice cream into the chilled coconut crust. Spread meringue quickly over entire top of pie. Bake in moderate oven (450°F.) 5 minutes, or until meringue is lightly browned. Serve at once, or keep in freezing compartment of refrigerator until ready to serve.
