

O.T. Grange Has Various Reports Name Committees

Committees were appointed at the regular meeting of the Oregon Trail Grange Tuesday night with the newly elected master, George Cleaver presiding.

O. E. Cheldelin, Alva Goodell, and Frank Parr were named to the legislative committee; Frank Sherwood, Robert Holmes and Loyd Adams, agriculture; Mrs. W. J. Gardner, pianist and Mrs. Alva Goodell, reporter. Mr. and Mrs. George Coleman were welcomed as new members.

Frank Sherwood talked on beef prices and reviewed a meeting at the Oregon Trail hall on Reapportionment spearheaded by Rep. Emil Stunz. Robert Holmes covered a beet meeting held Monday at the Nyssa high school; Loyd Adams commented upon the price range between farmers and consumers with particular reference to potato prices.

O. E. Cheldelin reported on the Grange and Farm Bureau's views on the farmer's support program. They think there should be more farm income and that the percentage of acreage should be cut before they are eligible for subsidy payments. There should also be payment for under-planting, farmers need less government interference and marketing agreements and they should halt the building of more irrigation projects, Cheldelin reported.

LeRoy Herrman told that the government wanted small farmers out of the picture. Following a report by Garrett Stam on weed control, the Grange went on record as favoring the use of ASC funds for weed control. This resolution was sent to the Pomona Grange and congressmen.

Alva Goodell reported that the County court was considering a ballot issue for an additional two-mill tax to support a full-time health unit and add a sale barn and exhibit building to the county fairgrounds at Ontario. This added levy would bring in approximately \$50,000. Some of this would be used for a court house surplus fund.

It was decided to send the Grange lecturer, Mrs. Garrett Stam to lecturer's school in La Grande in March. Mrs. Goodell announced the next card party at the hall Jan. 17 at 8:30 and Mrs. Stam reported on the trip abroad that she and Mr. Stam took last summer.
