Potato Growers Schedule Annual Meeting Jan. 17

Malheur potato growers will hold the annual meeting of their county association Tuesday at Boulevard Grange hall, Turner. Bond, extension agent and secretary of the group announced. Of chief interest to growers this year will be means to control disease problems that have grown serious proportions and strengthening of the marketing agreement program to regulate the quality of product going to market.

A report of new information on crop outlook for 1956 will be wired in by Marion Thomas, Agricultural economist, for presentation to the growers.

Meeting time has been set for 10:00 a. m. with a chicken dinner provided by the association at noon, through arrangement with the Grange home economics committee.

Robert Eaton, of the Portland office of USDA, will discuss proposed changes in Market Agreement Order No. 57, under which this county and the State of Idaho sell their potatoes. Changes in authority to regulate movement of both marketable potatoes and culls within the market agreement area and increases in representation from east Idaho district on the growing committee are among considerations on which local growers must register an opinion to be passed on to a USDA hearing in Pocatello.

The worst situation in virus spread in many years will be discussed by Turner Bond, both as it has affected the quality of local seed supplies for next year's planting, and as a quality factor in marketing late Russet potatoes.

Bond is expected to point out that heavy commercial losses could result from use of seed that has not been checked for quality, due to large concentrations of disease-spreading insects noted in the area in the 1955 growing season. A defect in late Russet potatoes resulting from infection with the leafroll virus has become a serious problem and will require special attention by growers of this variety.

An advertising program for promoting potato sales carried out in 1955 will be reported on by Maurice Judd, Jr., of Adrian, member of the Potato Association board of directors.

According to Association president Earl Winegar of Ontario, Potato Commission member Dudley Sitton will report on local uses of potato tax funds and elections will be held to select four members of the board of directors. Present directors whose terms will expire are Sam Hartley, Nyssa, Earl Winegar, Ontario, Floyd Miles, Vale, and Maurice Judd, Nyssa. Other directors whose terms do not expire this year are Dudley Sitton, Willowcreek, D. H. Christensen, Nyssa, and Harold Hart, Oregon Slope.

Growers to File By Jan. 20 For Beet Acreages

Sugar beet growers in Malheur county must file requests for individual farm sugar beet acreage shares for the 1956 season prior to the closing date, Jan. 20, according to the Malheur County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee.

Beet sugar allocation for 1956 for Oregon has been set at 17,805 acres, slightly more than their 1955 allotment of 17,685 acres. The U. S. Department of Agriculture recently set the national acreage objective for 1956 at 850,000, the same as last year. The entire acreage has been allotted to the U. S. with the exception of 500 acres set aside as national reserve.

The state ASC committee will establish individual farm allotments. It will also set aside not less than one percent of the state quota to allocate to new producers and a similar percentage for adjustment of shares under appeals. Producers must conform to their acreage allotments in marketing beets for sugar production in order to qualify for payments under the sugar act, the ASC committee emphasized.

Request forms for beet acreage shares may be obtained at the county ASC office at 63½ South Oregon, Ontario.
