10 Years Ago—Jan. 3, 1946

Postmaster Lloyd Lewis reported postal receipts the largest of any single quarter in the history of the institution. The receipts during the quarter were more than 7100. After more than three years in army service T/4 Ray Huffman saw his infant son for the first time when he returned home from a veterans hospital at Phoenix, Ariz. Mr. and Mrs. Huffman and 3-year-old son will go to Phoenix, Jan. 15 until Mr. Huffman is released from the hospital. The Malheur Jersey Cattle club elected Eugene Bair of Nyssa president.

15 Years Ago—Jan. 2, 1941

Sharon Anderson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Anderson of Nyssa, was the first baby born in Malheur county this year. Sharon was introduced by Dr. J. J. Sarazin. Doc Raffington in the Cow Hollow district drilled a well over 200 feet deep and got an abundance of water. "But so hard," that it would bounce, cows or sheep wouldn't drink it. Now he has an expensive well and no water.

20 Years Ago—Jan. 2, 1936

Work started this week on the school grounds at Adrian where a new grade school will be constructed. A total of 5 inches of snow has fallen in this area

since Thursday night. Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Leuhrs have moved back to Ontario where Mr. Leuhrs will be associated in the drug store with his father. Harry Ralston will replace Mr. Leuhrs at the drug store here. Attorney Carl Coad has taken up his residence in Nyssa.

35 Years Ago—Jan. 7, 1921

The new council, headed by Mayor P. M. Warren took charge of city affairs at the regular meeting Monday evening. Councilmen are, W. B. Hoxie, A. H. Boydell, F. E. Young and C. H. Prettyman. D. W. Gibson is treasurer. The home of John Kester on Bridge Island was entered Monday while the family was absent. Nothing of value was taken, but the intruder, possibly a hobo, helped himself to food. Marshal C. W. Reberger discovered a saddled horse with the bridle reins over the saddle horn, wandering at large.

45 Years Ago—Jan. 5, 1911

The Nyssa Commercial club is starting the new year by boosting for a bridge for Nyssa across the Snake river. The crossing is made by ferry at present. Rev. F. J. Bradley was quite seriously shaken up when his team ran away last Sunday. A portion of a new shipment of switches, curls, crownnets, turbanettes, hairnet and etc. were sold before they were unpacked at the Hinch store. Miss Chris Johnson left this week for Skull Springs to teach school. She feels she is going into the wilderness but hopes to survive until spring. W. R. Getler, organizer of the Grange for Eastern Oregon, has spent the past week in this vicinity. The organization of the Nyssa Grange will be perfected next Saturday at the Van Gilse hall. Mrs. Sutherland of Kentucky, 80 years old is visiting her brother, A. B. Nethery, 83. They hadn't met for over 40 years.
