The next meeting will be Feb. 3 at the home of Mrs. Grant B. Hughes.

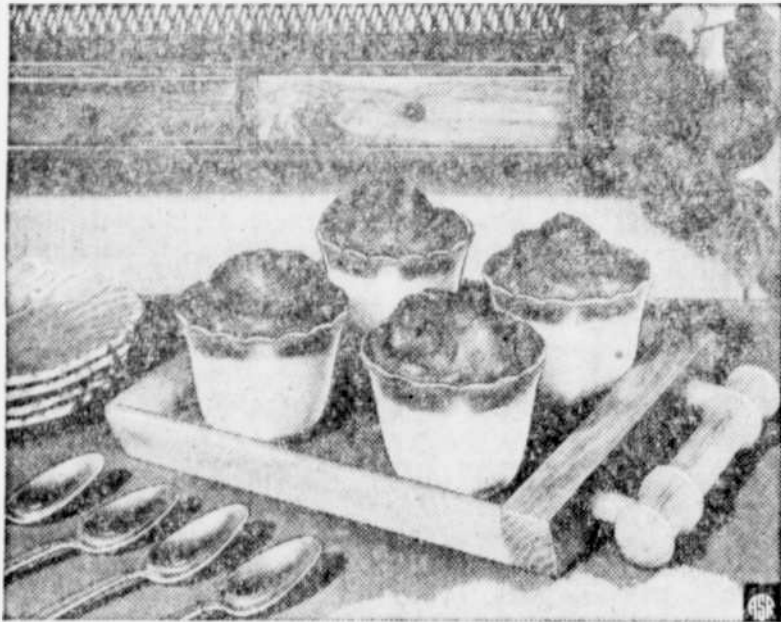

Serve Perky Pompadours On A Cool, Crispy Day



Baked like a custard, and served warm on a crisp, snappy day, these melt-in-the-mouth Coconut Pompadour Puddings are a delightful combination of smooth coconut cream pudding mix and frothy chocolate meringue.

Coconut Pompadour Pudding
1 package coconut cream pudding and pie filling mix
3 cups milk
2 egg yolks
2 egg whites, stiffly beaten
1 square unsweetened chocolate
6 tablespoons sugar
2 tablespoons milk

Combine pudding mix and $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of the milk in a saucepan. Add egg yolks and blend well. Then add remaining $\frac{3}{4}$ cups milk. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Pour into greased custard cups.
Melt chocolate over hot water. Add sugar and 2 tablespoons milk. Fold into egg whites. Pour into puddings. Place custard cups in pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 25 to 30 minutes. Then, serve warm. Makes 4 servings.

COLOR CLINIC

The gray tones are valuable in decorating, both as background colors in their own right and to tone down colors which are too bright. You can neutralize or "gray" a bright paint or dye by adding a little of the color opposite it in a color circle, but it is usually simpler to add pure gray. The most aggressive color can be neutralized with gray and made a softly pleasant background color. The dark, muddy tones people mistakenly call neutral come from too much gray in the mixture. Such charming shades as sage green, old gold, eggplant, reseda green, gray-blue, rose beige, etc. are all neutralized colors. Neutral brown has much the same useful harmonizing quality as gray, since it too results from mixing of all colors. This makes the lighter tints-tans, beige, etc., excellent background colors where a warm tone is needed, with the deep, strong brown shades as foundation colors for floors and furniture. Like the sturdy bark of the tree trunk, or the velvety richness of reddish earth, the brown and reddish earth colors suggest strength, vigor and dignity — qualities a man likes in his study or library.
