5 Years Ago—Jan. 25, 1951

Equipment to combat polio has been brought to the Malheur Memorial hospital through the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis.

10 Years Ago—Jan. 24, 1946

Tom Weeks has been appointed as city water superintendent succeeding Claude Willson, resigned. Mrs. George Bertch has a potted orange tree that is bearing oranges as large as hen eggs. Herschal Thompson was elected president of the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce. The first meeting of the adult sewing class will be held at the economics room in the high school under the direction of Miss Virginia Van Slyke.

15 Years Ago Jan. 23, 1941

Dr. K. E. Kerby was elected president of the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce. President Franklin D. Roosevelt who was inaugurated Monday, was the first president to be elected to a third term. Tues. Community Concert Features Baritone Soloist



Lawrence Winters

Lawrence Winters, distinguished baritone of the New York City Opera, is scheduled to give the next concert of the Malheur County Community Concert Association at the Ontario high school auditorium Jan. 30 at 8:15 p. m.

Mr. Winter's is the leading baritone of the New York City Opera Company and probably the most acclaimed Rigoletto on the American opera scene. He is equally known as a concert singer with a prized song repertoire. In addition to his tours of the United States, he annually goes to Europe and South America for engagements.

Lawrence Winters was born in South Carolina, the son of a cotton picker, and his life story is traced from cotton farming to concert and opera singing via the musical comedy stage. During his high school days, his music teacher discovered his vocal gifts and soon he was enrolled in Howard University. After earning his own tuition and maintenance, he was graduated from this school.

In 1942 Winters became a private in the Army and it was in the G. I. hit musical "Call Me Mister" that he first attracted attention with his notable performance. The next year he made his Town Hall debut, and was established overnight as one of America's gifted singers. Two years later he joined the New York City Center opera.

Among the imposing array of roles in which he has performed are Amonasro in "Aida", Dr. Miracle in "Tales of Hoffman", Tschello in "Love For Three Oranges", and the title role in "Rigoletto." Familiar to many is his recording of the complete original version of George Gershwin's "Porgy and Bess," released last year.

The Winter's concert is the third in the series for 1955-56. The final concert of the season for the Malheur County Concert Association, will be presented April 5, featuring Rey and Gomez, dance team.

After hearing of the probable future of the atomic-powered car, I've decided to stay in the gasoline-car business for a little while yet. If you've been waiting for the A-car, I'd settle for a G-buggy now. The atomic car, I find, will be a little while in the coming.

I had thought when the U. S. launched its atomic submarine, and a large company announced it had an atomic battery, that the gasoline business was soon to join that Valhalla where the buggy whip boys are.

But Andrew Kucher, an American automobile research director says there are still some mighty big hurdles to jump.

It's still conceivable, though, that some day a car will be injected with enough atomic fuel at the factory to radiate it along the street for the rest of its life.

The atomic battery is a step in that direction. But its efficiency in converting atomic energy to electrical energy is extremely low — something like one-tenth of one percent.

Another problem is the shielding of the atomic material. It takes many tons of heavy material to surround the active materials in the atom-sub and the amount of shielding needed would be just as much in a smaller power plant. So the atomic car isn't around the next corner, or even the corner after that.
