Game Department Releases Angling Regs. for 1956

The Oregon Game commission set the proposed angling regulations for 1956 at a meeting Friday in Portland. Liberalization of rules for trout anglers keynoted the session.

Although no sweeping changes were made in bag or length limits, rules on angling closures were released opening up many miles of previously closed streams for both winter and summer fishing.

Several areas mentioned are of particular interest to fishermen in this area. Beulah reservoir will be open to trout angling the entire year with a bag limit of 10 fish per day, 20 in possession; Owyhee River is closed to angling for a distance of 150 yards below the dam; Unity reservoir, bag limit is 10 fish per day over six inches in length, 20 in possession.
