Western States Organize Animal Disease Assoc.

A large stride has been taken toward the eventual goal of getting a Northwest regional livestock disease research laboratory, reports Dr. L. M. Koger, Ontario veterinarian, and Joe Hobson, Malheur county farmer representing Oregon Farm Bureau Federation. Koger and Hobson recently returned from a western regional livestock disease meeting held in Salt Lake City, Utah.

During the meeting attended by state veterinarians, Farm Bureau representatives, deans of agricultural colleges, woolgrowers, and cattlemen's associations from the eleven western states, Texas and Oklahoma, the Western Regional Animal Disease Association was organized. This organization is to be composed of representatives from all organizations interested in animal health in the eleven western states.

Dr. Schnieder, state veterinarian of Idaho, was selected chairman of the group and Dr. K. J. Peterson, state veterinarian of Oregon, secretary. From this group a special committee is to be appointed to work toward the establishment of additional disease research facilities.

The facilities desired are to supplement the research work now being done by state colleges and experiment stations. The highly infectious diseases involved, which threaten the livestock industry most, require specially constructed laboratories to assure complete isolation. Interest in this type of research facilities was started in Malheur county by the Livestock Association in 1951. Diseases which were causing severe losses at that time with no known control measures were Anaplasmosis, Leptospirosis, and certain types of scours in calves. In 1953 the County Livestock Disease Committee was formed which included representatives of all livestock organizations; the Farm Bureau, Grange, local and state veterinarians, and the Animal Research division of the U. S. D. A. Among the objectives they have worked toward is the research facilities.

Cheeseburger Loaf

(Makes 6 to 8 servings)

1/2 cup dehydrated
Carnation Evaporated Milk
1 egg
1 cup cracker crumbs
1 1/2 pounds ground beef

1 1/2 teaspoons salt
2 tablespoons chopped onion
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1 tablespoon catsup
1 cup grated American cheese

Blend all ingredients except cheese until thoroughly mixed. Line loaf pan with heavy waxed paper. Place 1/2 cup cheese in bottom of pan. Cover with half of meat mixture. Repeat with remaining cheese and meat layers. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 1 hour. Let stand about 10 minutes before turning out on platter. Remove paper. Slice for serving.

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
