Residents of the school district have seen fit to say "yes" time and again for school bonds to expand the educational system, knowing full well there would be more bond issues in the future. Farmers in the Nyssa Road Improvement district each year tax themselves 10 mills on top of a basic 10 mill tax they approve every five years. Town residents have overwhelmingly approved additional expenses for street maintenance and for a new water system.

Maybe they should have waited and Uncle Sam would have come to the rescue.

It's almost certain now that Congress will provide some federal aid to education. Many Republicans, who so long have opposed federal aid, are now singing the praises of some kind of a "cleansed" form of benefits for schools.

Think of the money we could have saved, had we allowed our kids to attend crowded schools and laid off a few teachers in the name of economy. We could then have been classified as in dire need of federal funds, which probably would amount to many times the tax dollars we all have struggled to provide.

If we could wait long enough, there may be federal funds for all these other projects a progressive citizenry are now providing by the sweat of their brow.

It seems that a large part of America is becoming indolent and entirely without initiative, if the complaints voiced by the politicians are representative of the people. More and more they are calling on the federal government for help and at the same time are complaining about increased taxes.

Perhaps this community is different from those we read about where "children are suffering" for lack of school facilities. Maybe it's not made up of "suckers", but of self-reliant, individualists who get things done for themselves like the pioneers who built the west.

In any event, it's fun to live among residents such as these you find in this community, whether they may be "suckers" or rugged individualists.
