5 Years Ago—Feb. 1, 1951

The \$100,000 Polar Cold Storage and Locker plant, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Marshall, and thousands of pounds of meat, fruit and vegetables, was destroyed by fire Sunday evening. Nyssa volunteer firemen fought the blaze in 19 above zero temperature. J. R. Child was named Justice of the Peace to serve during the absence of Don Graham who has enlisted in the Navy. A \$2000 note burning ceremony was held by members of the Christian church Sunday. Rev. Charles Addleman gave the address.

10 Years Ago—Jan. 31, 1946

The Nyssa Food Center and the Hollingsworths' Implement Co. will be opened Saturday in the new block building at Sixth and Main streets, erected by Al Chadwick. Jake Kraal and Mancil Bishop purchased the Phillips building on First street from Lottie Phillips. They will use the building for storage, a second hand store, and fix-it shop. The Bybee Bros have been appointed agents for the Kaiser-Frazer automobiles. They will erect a building at the "Y" west of Gordon's Market. Edwin Burton, Jr., has been employed to teach physics, general science and general mathematics in the Nyssa high school.

15 Years Ago—Jan. 30, 1941

The city council is negotiating with a Boise firm for a new grader. A new half-ton pick-up was bought to be used by Cliff Greer in the water department. The sugar beet campaign for the Nyssa district came to a close today, according to Ray G. Larson, district manager, ending a run of 113 days. A feast of current fiction greets the reader in the new books going into circulation on Saturday, Jan. 28, at the Malheur County Library.

The Smiling Rebel, by Harnett is a novel based on the life of Belle Boyd, charming Civil War spy for the Confederates who lived to marry a Yankee Officer.

The Golden Journey is Agnes Turnbull's new novel with a large eastern industrial city as its setting, and as its main characters a man of financial and political power, his daughter, and a young man to whom he offers an amazing opportunity in politics.

The Prophet is a new Biblical novel by Sholem Asch concerning the second Isaiah "who preached an end of the Babylonian captivity, who proclaimed Jehovah as the one God, and who promised that a Messiah would come."

An Episode of Sparrows, by Rumer Godden is the story of how two children of Catford Street, London, where there grew not so much as a blade of grass, made a garden in unpromising surroundings.

Norman Mailer's new novel, Deer Park is the story of two love affairs, against the background of Desert D'Or, a pleasure resort in southern California patronized by the movie great. Mailer is also author of The Naked and the Dead, a story of World War II.

Intimate Story, by Rose Frankel tells how a middle-aged widow who feels lost when her daughter marries and leaves home, reaches out for new beginnings, for new love and life.

The Look of the Old West, by William Harris describes in picture and text what people ate, drank, wore, and used out West from Civil War times to the 1890's; it includes army uniforms and weapons as well as civilian clothing.

An omnibus, World of Bemelmans, brings together five stories and articles by Ludwig Bemelmans not previously published in book form, along with his four books, My War with the United States, Small Beer, Donkey Inside, and I Love You, I Love You, I Love You.

Humorous articles and stories and drawings about dogs by James Thurber appear in Thurber's Dogs.

I Traveled a Lonely Land, by Nina Pulliam contains impressions by an American newspaperwoman of Australia where she traveled extensively.

Rachel Carson, author of The Sea Around Us, now writes of the shore life where sea meets land—"the rugged shores of rock, the sand beaches, and the coral reefs and all their associated features" with their seaweed, snails, clams, etc.—in her new book, The Edge of the Sea.

CARS ARE MY Line

Someone has estimated the average driver wastes, just throws away uselessly, 34 gallons of gasoline a year, enough to keep a car on the road for a month or six weeks.

Studies over a number of years have shown that motorists are averaging 18 miles to the gallon when they should be getting 19. Silly driving habits, we might as well be blunt about it, are mainly to blame.

There are so many "rules for drivers" that one person can't possibly keep them all in his head. But these six rules come from the head of a big fleet of company cars; he found these rules cut their costs-per-mile way down and brought that extra month of free driving.

Don't make jackrabbit starts. Get away smoothly and shift into high gear as soon as possible.

Slow down gradually when you know you're going to have to stop. Your car runs on the power from gasoline already burned, so there's no sense wasting all that momentum by coming to quick stops.

Don't race your motor while waiting for lights to change or while warming up.

Moderate speeds save gas and save the brakes.

Don't ride the clutch or brakes.
