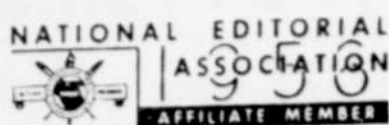

Heart Disease vs Macrostromia

A few politicians are using President Eisenhower's heart attack last September as a political argument against his running for president this fall. Rest assured, that the comments will become more frequent and more venomous as the campaign progresses.

The self-styled diagnosticians have chosen to forget that there are hundreds of thousands of men and women in America who have suffered heart attacks and are leading normal lives even to the extent of hard work.

Sometimes a heart attack can be turned to an advantage. Very often the victim is forced to change his pattern of life, not necessarily by slowing down or by refusing to work, but by attacking problems from a different angle and performing as much as he did before in such a manner that chances of a sudden strain are greatly reduced.

The rate of death from heart attacks is high, but little or no publicity is given to the anticipated lifespan of those who have recovered from a heart condition. It is said that medical authorities agree that susceptibility to some other illnesses and even to some types of accidents is lessened for that group of individuals who have been forced to re-evaluate their habits and make changes for the better.

There is at least one affliction suffered by many politicians—including numerous U. S. Senators—that is far more dangerous than heart disease. It can do great harm to the American people even if its prevalence extends no farther than the halls of Congress. That ailment is macrostromia, better known as abnormal largeness of the mouth.

The Law Needs Changing

Oregon's legislature should follow the lead of other states and revise its birth registration laws to eliminate the need to brand for life all illegitimate children born within the state. As the law now stands, a hospital registrar must ask the mother if she is married to the child's father and record yes or no on the standard certificate of birth.

The question is ridiculous since it serves no useful purpose in the interests of health, economy or society. An innocent child must bear the shame of errant parents throughout his life while any wrong-doing of the father and mother is forgotten, all because of a technical point in the law which says it must be recorded.

Previous legislatures have attempted to correct this mistake and failed. Perhaps the 1957 session will bring about the needed change.
