5 Years Ago—Feb. 21, 1948

Gene Stunz, Nyssa, and Dave Nicholson, Ontario, won the speech contests conducted by the Toastmasters club at a dinner held in the economics room at the high school Wednesday night. The winner of each club will participate in the sub-district tournament to be held in Payette. . . . The Nyssa FFA chapter won second place in a regional parliamentary contest sponsored by the FFA in Pendleton last Saturday. . . . The first music clinic ever held in Nyssa, conducted last week end with 800 SRV pupils participating. . . . In the American Legion oratorical contest held last Thursday evening, first place went to Jennie Eachus, Nyssa high school junior.

10 Years Ago—Feb. 21, 1946

15 trailer houses have been allotted to Nyssa by the Federal Public Housing Authority for the relief of the acute housing situation in this city. . . . Frank T. Morgan of Nyssa, was elected president and Bernard Frost was elected secretary-treasurer of the

Associated Chamber of Commerce of Southern Idaho & Eastern Oregon at a meeting held in Caldwell Monday night. . . . A large group of dairymen met in the gymnasium Tuesday and voted to invite the Avost Corporation to establish a plant in Nyssa for the processing of milk. . . . Rev. H. A. Heckmann, pastor of the Lutheran Church, suffered minor bruises when his automobile overturned on the highway between Homedale and Marsing. . . . Word has been received at the County Agent's office that trees for farm wind break and shelter plantings will again be available from the State Board Forestry.

15 Years Ago Feb. 20, 1941

Earl B. Reed, Supervisor of the Agriculture and Industrial Development of the Union Pacific, suggested at a meeting of the Associated Chambers of Commerce that the potato industry could solve its problem by the establishment of a starch factory. . . . Work was started on the new \$13,000 building that will house a Signal Oil Service station and the new Malheur Motors Ford Agency. . . . Henry H. Hartley, for the past year principal of the Nyssa Union high school, was re-elected for another one-year term by the high school board. . . . Mrs. Joe Stam received a letter from a relative in occupied Holland. It is the first to our knowledge to reach the region since the German invasion of the Low Lands. The letter stated the relatives were all O. K. . . . The foundation for the new church in Sunset Valley is completed and work will be started on the frame this week if the weather permits.

DeBord of a fine team of 3 and 4 year old fillies. . . . The mail carrier between Ontario and Nyssa has been unable to make part of the route since last Wednesday on account of bad roads. . . . Lund Brothers lost 15 head of sheep last Saturday when a portion of their lambing sheds near Pete Tensen's ranch collapsed from weight of snow and killed them. . . . The Owyhee river made a sudden unanticipated rise Thursday night, coming up 5 feet 8 inches.

CARS ARE MY Life

When a road-expert friend of mine first mentioned that engineers were experimenting with rubber roads I thought "Oh Boy, you'll be able to bounce those pedestrians like tennis balls right over to the sidewalk."

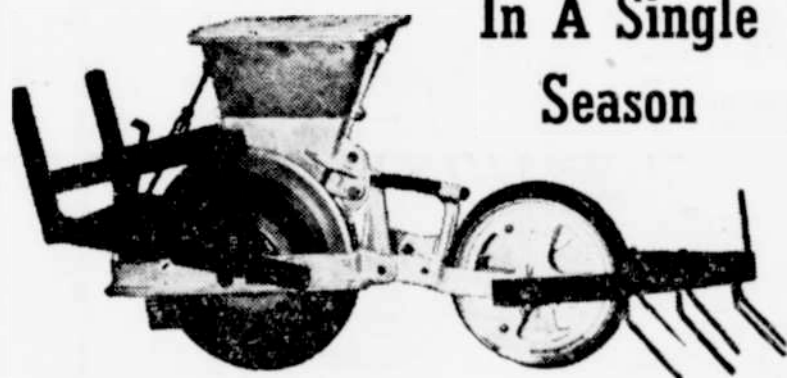
