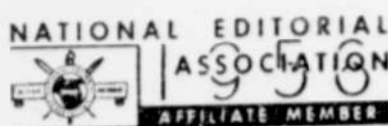

### RELIGION IN LIFE

#### Some Hazards of Going to Church

Ministers are always urging people to go to church and they tend to gauge their effectiveness by the numerical response. Many and varied are the reasons given for non-attendance but rarely, if ever, does a person say he is afraid to go to church. Modern psychology tells us that we unconsciously cover up our real feelings so perhaps that some folks fear the sanctuary and do not realize it. Certainly there is no cause for physical fear from fire, riots, or assault. However, there are some calculated risks involved; let me mention two.

First there is the fear of mortal sinful man facing a righteous God. We often talk or sing glibly of the "Man Upstairs" and it sounds like we are buddies; but there is the danger that we might be confronted as was Isaiah in the Temple and feel as he did, "Woe Is Me, For I Am Undone, I Am A Man of Unclean Lips." How do you feel when in the presence of one who knows your inmost thoughts? It's terrifying, isn't it? Of course we have known a multitude of people who have gone to church regularly for years and have been well insulated from such an experience.

The second risk stems from the first. Assuming that we experience the presence of God we find him not the stern judge but a loving Father. Love demands loyalty and service so we hear, as did Isaiah, a call "Whom shall I send and who will go for us?" To answer such a call can change one's whole life and cost money. To grow spiritually hurts. So we stay away from church and try to justify ourselves by the usual excuses . . . No time, too many hypocrites, I was forced to go as a child. I can worship at home, etc.

Why not live dangerously and venture out to church next Sunday?
