5 Years Ago—Mar. 1, 1951

Mrs. Carlos Buchner was elected president of the Malheur Memorial hospital Auxiliary at a meeting Monday. At a meeting of the city council Feb. 16, the councilmen ordered the city police to check more closely on over-time parking. The council ordered the installation of mercury vapor street lights from Fourth street to the underpass and one in each block from East First to the Snake river bridge. The Amalgamated Sugar Co. manufactured 152,000,000 pounds of sugar in the Nyssa factory during the campaign that ended this week, according to Jared Lewis, district manager.

10 Years Ago—Feb. 28, 1946

The Nyssa Chamber of Commerce has voted to give away a jeep in raising funds for the proposed Malheur Memorial hospital. Tom Moore, high scorer for the Nyssa basketball team scored a total of 410 points. Thirty dollars in cash was stolen from the Owyhee Drug Store Monday night by burglars who gained entrance by breaking the window in the front door. The Nyssa Tractor and Auto Co. will hold its formal opening of its new building on Good Ave. between First and Second streets Mar. 6th and 7th. C. G. Waggoner, owner, announced.

20 Years Ago—Feb. 27, 1936

L. W. Brainard, commercial manager of the Idaho Power Co. was transferred to Payette as Division Manager replacing J. C. Baldridge who was transferred to Boise. Ray Mull was buried alive at the gravel pit west of Nyssa when it caved away. He escaped with a broken foot when others at the pit came to his rescue. Three others, Dave Dugger, Howard Greenup and Herb Lythgoe, narrowly escaped and were buried to the waist in the cave-in. A. Chadwick, Archie Howell and Jack Keizer who were at the pit helped release the men. Survey was started by the Idaho Power to bring a power line to the Nyssa CCC camp.

30 Years Ago—Feb. 19, 1926

Pete Tensen, Nyssa wheatgrower was named an executive committeeman to represent Malheur county at a conference at Moro last week. Chas. Holton of Weiser, head mechanic at the Tensen Motor Co., moved in the S. D. Goshert house on north First street this week. Several changes were made this week at the OSL depot. Agent Crocker was transferred to a similar position at Richfield, Ida., and C. E. Evans of Ban-

croft, Ida., was given the position of operator.

35 Years Ago—Feb. 25, 1921

Fred Pullen of Owyhee went to Vale on horseback taking two coyote skins and four muskrat skins. While there he attended a basketball game. Warren Fenn and Archie Sinclair made a trade this week by which Mr. Fenn secured 160 acres in Kingman Colony and Mr. Sinclair becomes the owner of a valuable residence property on Third st. in Nyssa. A new piano for the club room was purchased by Nyssa firemen. The room is being fitted with gymnasium equipment.

40 Years Ago—Mar. 3, 1916

The annual city election was held Monday and S. D. Goshert was elected mayor, J. Boydell, recorder; W. W. Foster, treasurer and L. Spier, S. F. Foster, Frank Leuck and F. O. Carman, councilmen. A King road drag has been purchased by the county court and all the principal roads of the county will be gone over and properly shaped up. The small daughter of the H. Walters had the misfortune to break her left arm when she was thrown from the family cow which she was riding. The Journal management will erect a one-story office building on a lot purchased from W. B. Hoxie. A. D. Morey, one of the oldest pioneer settlers on the Owyhee, celebrated his 63rd birthday when 50 friends surprised him. His name is on the Methodist church book which was the first church organization here.

COUNTY LIBRARY

A readable group of books that includes some of the "Notable Books of 1955" goes into circulation on Saturday, Feb. 25, at the Malheur County Library.

The Columbia by Stewart Holbrook is a book depicting the history of the great river and of the region through which it flows. It is one of the "Rivers of America" series.

The Secret of the Hittites is a new book by Kurt Marek (who uses the penname of C. W. Ceram), author of "Gods, Graves, and Scholars." It is the story of the development of Hittitology, newest branch of the science of archeology, through which the history of an ancient people is becoming known.

Edwin O'Connor's novel, The Last Hurrah, is the Atlantic prize novel and tells of Frank Skeffington's fifty years in politics, depicting him as half hero, half rascal.

Mr. Hamish Gleave by Richard Llewellyn is a suspenseful story of how a non-communist official of the British Foreign Office is led to betray friends and country.

The Lark Shall Sing by Elizabeth Cadell is a lighthearted novel about the six individualists in the Wayne family, ranging in age from nine to twenty-four, the oldest of whom decides to make the family a going concern.

A collection of short stories under the title of A Piece of Luck comes from the pen of Frances Gray Patton, author of "Good Morning, Miss Dove."

The growth and form of our cities and towns is the subject of the social history by Christopher Tunnard and Henry Reed, American Skyline, which links our urban development with our broad cultural manifestations. A "Notable Book."

Frontiers of Astronomy by Fred Hoyle discusses present theories of astronomy and the modern techniques which are expanding man's knowledge of the universe. A "Notable Book."

Will Herberg offers an interpretation of the religious aspects in the changing structure of American society, and views specific religious as they affect and are affected by our way of life, in Protestant-Catholic-Jew. A "Notable Book."

The Complete Book of Home Decoration by James Mayabb is designed as an aid to planning and as a money-saver for anyone wishing to make his home more comfortable or better looking.

Joan Dunn's book Retreat from Learning is a case history whose subtitle is "Why Teachers Can't Teach." She tells of her own four years of teaching in a metropolitan high school.

A collection of short stories by Jessamyn West is called Love, Death, and the Ladies' Drill Team. These stories appeared originally in such magazines as "The New Yorker," "Harpers Magazine," and "Mademoiselle."

Farewell to Valley Forge by David Taylor is a novel about a young American spy in the Revolutionary War.

Showdown Creek by Lucas Todd is a western story concerning a respected rancher troubled by a revenge-seeking man out of his past.
