424,429 Trout Stocked In Area

The Oregon Game Commission in their February issue reported that 424,429 rainbow were stocked in watersheds 9 10, and 11 during 1955.

Watershed nine comprises Baker, Malheur and Union; watershed 10, Malheur, Grant and Harney and watershed 11 Malheur and Harney.

On a statewide basis 7, 282,744 rainbow were stocked.

Commission Checks Snake River Catfish

The following report on the growth of channel catfish in the Snake was reported by the game commission in their February issue:

"Channel catfish in the Snake River are being checked through age and growth to see how well they are fitting into their new environment. Indications to date are that our 'channels' are making greater growth than that recorded for catfish from the Mississippi River. Fish from 7.5 to 9.5 inches are in their third year. Fish in their fourth year range from 13 to 18 1/2 inches and fish in their seventh year were 22 to 24 inches and weighed roughly 7 pounds. A 14-pound fish measuring 31 inches was found to have been in its eleventh year.
