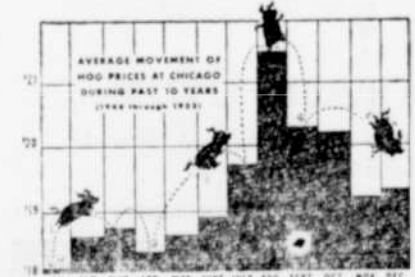

Peak prices used to come in
September, but they have moved
forward to August as the chart
shows. You should crowd pigs
now to get them off to market be-
fore the price drops. Yes sir, time
means nothing to a hog but it

Sportsmen Ask United Front For Dam Road

The Izaak Walton League of
Malheur county has issued an ap-
peal to all residents of the coun-
ty to present a solid front in de-
manding that a road to the Owy-
hee dam be built and that a state
park be established at the dam.
Through E.E. Cloninger, secre-
tary, the organization has taken
the stand that this section of Ore-
gon has an "orphan status" as far
as the State of Oregon is concern-
ed, notwithstanding that large
sums of money in gasoline and
other taxes are contributed by
the citizens of Malheur county.
The league figures that too much
of such sums is spent on the west
side of the state for highways and
recreational areas.

Unless a state park is establish-
ed at the dam it is felt that the
\$4000 expended there plus a
great deal of free labor will have
been wasted.

Limit on Bass At Dam Sought

A request that a limit be put
on the number of bass at Owy-
hee reservoir has been sent to
the state fisheries department
by the Malheur county Izaak
Walton League.
E. E. Cloninger, secretary, has
reported that he has personally
seen fishermen taking tub and
sacks of bass from the waters.
Cloninger said he had reason to
believe a fair percentage of the
bass thus caught ended up in
garbage cans or dumps—not on
dinner tables.

The league also requested that
the first mile of the river be
restricted to fishing by children.
