dicative of his present position. During his secondary education at Imbler he was active in baseball, basketball, speech meets, student government and FFA work.

He was student body president of the high school and that year was chosen as one of the 10 outstanding seniors in the state named to compete for the Aaron Frank scholarship, an annual award made from 1934 until last year.

While Dick wasn't named "it", his being chosen to compete for the scholarship was a signal honor.

Graduating from high school in 1939, Wilson next attended the Eastern Oregon College of Education where he was named freshman class president and in his third year student body prexy. He also won letters in basketball and baseball.

Dick then moved to Oregon State where he majored in agriculture for two terms before joining the air force in which he served three years, coming out a 1st sergeant.

Miserable weather shouldn't bother Dick too much for he was stationed at Shemya, an Aleutian chain outpost, for two years where he was attached to the 344th fighter squadron.

He got away from the island just once to compete in an all-Alaska track meet held at Fairbanks. Your reporter who spent a couple of years at Adak can fully appreciate why Dick, no doubt overcome by bright lights, could finish no better than fourth in the 100 and 220 yard dashes.

Our schoolmaster returned to the states in March, 1946 and in April married Marian Brady at her home in Adams, Oregon. They have two children, Carolyn, six and Susan, 22 months.

Dick returned to OSC and received his bachelor of science degree in agriculture with a minor in education.

He came to Nyssa in April, 1947 as an instructor in the farm veteran program. He moved over to vocational teaching at the high school and was named principal of the school in Sept., 1951 when Dennius Patch moved away. He took over his present position in Aug. 1954 when Henry Hartley resigned.

Wilson is a past president of the Nyssa Lions club and a member of the chamber of commerce. He has also been president of the Oregon Vocational association, is a member of the legislative committee of the Oregon Educational association and a member of the board of control, SRV school masters association.

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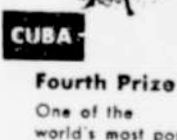
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
