New City Water System Working Satisfactorily

Nyssa's new \$183,000 water system has been in operation since March 14 and everything is working satisfactorily, according to City Manager Jack Middaugh. Completion of the Ranney well and all phases of the new system had been delayed for several months because of various difficulties ranging from defective pipe to minor flaws in the chlorinating system that delayed switchover to the new wells earlier this month.

Middaugh said that two reports have been received from the state health department showing the water is free of all bacteria. At the present time the new well water is slightly softer than that from the old wells, but hardness is expected to increase as soon as high water goes down. The new water is not expected to be any harder than that from the old wells, the city manager said.

City crews have begun flushing all water mains to completely clear them of any sand and other foreign materials and the operation will be repeated immediately after the first flushing is completed, Middaugh said.
