Bulldogs Win Track Contest

The Nyssa Bulldogs opened the track season with a victory quadrangular meet over Weiser, Vale and Fruitland in the opening competition of the year March 23 when the squads met at Weiser.

Nyssa squeezed out a victory scoring 53 points to Weiser's 51½ with the full responsibility resting in the legs of Dennis Savage who won the final event, the broadjump, to assure the Bulldogs a win.

Vale tallied 41 points and Fruitland 26½ in the interesting meet. Yesterday afternoon the Bulldogs entertained Weiser, Emmett, Vale and Fruitland in an invitational meet held at the local field.

Game Commission Okeys Projects

Several projects affecting fish and game were passed upon by the Oregon Game Commission at their regular business meeting March 16.

Of interest to salmon fishermen was the green light for the Depoe Bay boat hoist where a capital outlay of \$1,780.00 was approved for the purchase and installation of the hoist.

The commission approved the agreement with the Multnomah County Park Board for the development of a park and picnic area on Oak Island on the Sauvie Island management area. The plan would call for a county road to be built to the north tip of Oak Island and development of the island into a park equipped with tables, cooking facilities, and sanitation facilities. No overnight camping would be allowed, and the park would be closed to public entry during the waterfowl season.

Approximately 120,000 people used Sauvie Island for recreational purposes last year pointing out the need for such an installation. Multnomah county will carry out all development work.

Game farm production for the coming season was also agreed upon at the meeting. Approximately 31,000 upland game birds will be raised at the three game farms located at Ontario, Hermiston, and Corvallis. At the E. E. Wilson farm near Corvallis, 13,000 pheasants are on the production schedule. Ontario will produce 10,000 of the long-tailed birds. At the Hermiston plant, 8,000 chukars will be produced.

This as a reduction in the number of birds from that produced last year, but the commission felt that by less crowding of birds in the rearing pens, better birds would be available for the hunter. Under crowded conditions, the birds are not only susceptible to diseases but they have a tendency of chasing each other and pulling out the tail feathers making them an undesirable field bird.

The commission also gave the go-ahead to the St. Johns Chapter of the Izaak Walton League to install outdoor toilets and garbage disposal units at the popular fishing area known as Lyons beach on Sauvie Island. In consideration of the development and maintenance of the area by the Beaver Chapter, Izaak Walton League, the Waltonians will officially name the beach "Walton Beach."

An agreement between the commission and the Grants Pass Irrigation District was also approved in regard to the operation and maintenance of the Savage Rapids screens, contingent upon the passage of a bill now pending in Congress for the appropriation of funds for the screening of the irrigation intakes. The Savage Rapids irrigation intakes on the Rogue river have long been a stumbling block for downstream migrant steelhead and salmon where tremendous losses occur each year.

The Rogue river access sites, previously approved by the commission, were abandoned. The Conway site was abandoned when it was learned that the river had changed course from the recent floods completely isolating the site from the river. At the Payton bridge site the commission felt that a bad rapids directly below the boat launching site would be too dangerous for safe passage by the average boatman. For the more daring who wanted to shoot these fast rapids, other launching sites are available farther up the river.

Development of the Bellingier boat landing and parking area on the McKenzie river was also approved.
