"Twenty-five thousand dollars' worth of potatoes were raised by one man on 50 acres a few miles outside of Vale," says Robert D. Lytle, district attorney, who is registered at the Imperial from Vale. "We never saw so many spuds before as we have this year. There will be about \$8,000 worth. The price opened at \$1 a hundredweight and went to \$1.85. In Willow Creek valley, in the Brogan and Jamieson section, the fruit crop will bring about \$10,000. They've had a wonderful crop. Many farmers plowed up their alfalfa land and planted to grain or potatoes, and potatoes are bringing the best crop. The depression in Malheur county has been keen, but we are now recovering. In a way it was a good thing for the people, for it taught them that they would have a diversity of crops. When everyone was raising hay, they were dependent on the stock market, and when the cattle business slumped and hay dropped so low that there was scarcely a paying price, the farmers found that they would have to look to something other than hay if they wished to be independent. The sheep and cattle business is on the mend as there is an increasing local market for lambs and feeders."

This news article from the October 11, 1921 issue of the Portland Oregonian will recall for many Bob's continuing interest in the economy of his area. His active interest in agriculture, timber, stock raising and mining development of Southeast Oregon has continued since then.

This has put him close to the needs of the area and its people. This understanding means intelligent justice.

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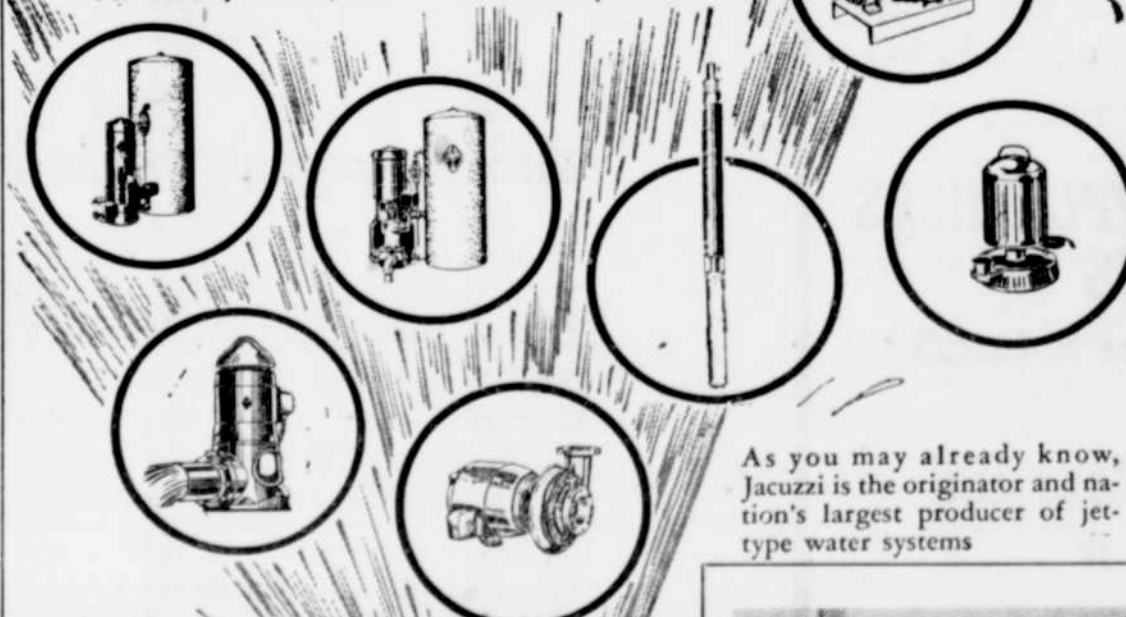
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
