5 Years Ago—April 19, 1931

Mrs. Leo Gortyer was elected president of the PTA. Dr. W. W. Eastop of Denver has arrived to take over the veterinary practice of Dr. Hal White who has gone to Washington to take a government position. The Nyssa exchange of the Malheur Telephone Co. has passed the 100 mark of telephones in use. The increase was 120 percent and the population growth 23 per cent.

The large residence on the Dale Garrison farm southwest of Nyssa was destroyed by fire last Saturday. The house was occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Morfitt who lost all of their household belongings.

10 Years Ago—April 18, 1926

Portland architects were in Nyssa Wednesday looking at possible sites for the proposed Malheur Memorial hospital. Ed Case of the Hi-way Mds. Mart has purchased several buildings at Camp Abbott near Bend and is hauling the lumber to Nyssa. He has hauled 30,000 feet and has 70,000 feet more to haul. Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Foster and Raymond Sager took 550 colonies of bees to the Dalles last week to be placed in cherry orchards.

15 Years Ago—April 17, 1921

Owen Price was named as grade school principal for the coming year. Members and the Board of Directors of the Methodist church will hold dedication services for their parsonage and the ceremony of the laying of the corner stone for the new church Sunday. Mrs. A. V. Cook was elected president of the VFW. Mayor and Mrs. J. C. Olson donated 8 Boston Ivy plants to the city park for planting on the hand ball court.

Harold Kurtz was elected president of the FFA.

20 Years Ago—April 16, 1916

Tom Ferguson, driver of the Apple Valley school bus was seriously burned in a fire last week which destroyed the school truck and the garage. The fire was believed to have started from defective wiring. Pud Long of Nyssa caught a 9 foot 320 sturgeon in the Snake river near Adrian last Friday. It was one of the largest sturgeon caught in recent years. Long also caught one weighing 100 pounds Thursday. Water from the Owyhee reservoir was turned into the Main canal Wednesday.

30 Years Ago—April 9, 1906

Most of the housewives in the Owyhee district are busy setting hens and tending incubators. The Old Oregon Trail will be oiled from The Dalles to Ontario starting next week. Dewey Ray and family moved to the E. McEllan house. The 3-act play Cappy Ricks was presented at the Liberty Theater to an audience of 200 people. High school teachers and students rendered the play splendidly.

35 Years Ago—April 8, 1921
