Miss Whitaker said that the group would continue with its usual summer activities, which include sewing, cooking, manual arts, and other handwork. The budget for the project is being planned now, and there are also plans to add to the play equipment within the camp grounds.

A new three month program will start June 11 in the Caldwell camp. Miss Whitaker also stated. This program will include remedial education at the College of Idaho during its summer session.
