Students View G.E.'s "House of Magic"

Demonstrations based on developments from General Electric's research laboratories, include

making music ride a beam of light, the exploding of paper, and conjuring a column of plastic foam from an ice cream dish. Lecturers with the show are Larry J. LeVieux and John R. Pearson.

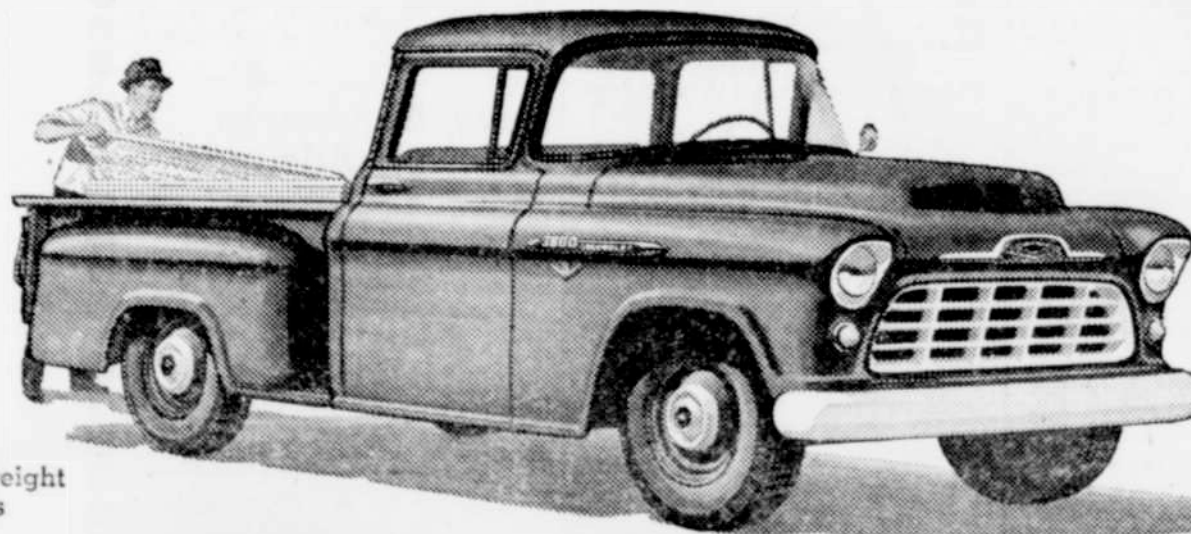
