Recreation Program For Nyssa Announced by Jarrett, House

The Nyssa summer recreation program planned for children from six to 14 will get underway Monday, June 11, following registration Friday, June 8.

Monday, June 11 has been set aside as "play day" for all the children at the high school football field.

Activities opening day will include sack races, relays, tug-of-war, bicycle riding race, pop drinking contest, suit case relay. The free play will include softball, ping pong, croquet and other supervised recreation.

June 12 will feature baseball with the children being divided into three age groups.

The first few days of the program instruction periods will be held. The recreation games will be played Monday and Wednesday afternoons and it is hoped that games with neighboring communities can be held.

Beginning June 18 handicraft instruction will be given in the afternoons. Details will be announced at a later date.

A track meet will be held June 25. Events will include baseball throw, 50 yard dash, 400 yard run, broad jump, high jump and relay.

Other events scheduled for the summer include a tennis tournament, ping pong tournament, displays of handicraft work and awards and a checker tournament.

In addition to the scheduled activities equipment will be available for softball, volleyball, jollyball, badminton, tennis, ping pong, drawing, croquet and other games.

The program will be supervised by Bill Jarrett and Anne House.

Mrs. J. W. Rigney To National PTA Meeting at 'Frisco

Mrs. J. W. Rigney returned to Nyssa Sunday morning after attending the National convention for Parents and Teachers in San Francisco May 14, 15 and 16 and a meeting of Special Education teachers Friday and Saturday in Salem.

Mrs. John Elfering, Vale was one of the 48 delegates from Oregon at the national convention. One of the highlights of the session, according to Mrs. Rigney was the arrival of a Japanese delegation of 55 representatives from PTA organizations throughout Japan, for which the Oregon group acted as hosts.

Although communication with the Japanese was necessarily limited to smiles, handshakes and gestures, Mrs. Rigney reported, the guests readily understood the word "ice cream" (a commodity uncommon in Japan). "It was thrilling to realize that languages present no real barriers when parents and teachers meet. We shared pictures of our children, exchanged names and addresses and compared membership pins," she stated. In a speech by the Japanese national PTA president, they noted that the goals of PTA are world-reaching, "to promote the welfare of children and youth in home, school, church and community."

The Salem meeting for special education instructors especially emphasized the problems concerned with educating the mentally retarded children who have the potential ability of becoming socially competent but present a real problem in the regular classrooms.
