Jarrett Resigns To Accept Job At Ontario High

Bill Jarrett, for the past year the head basketball and baseball coach at Nyssa high school tendered his resignation to the school board in order to accept a position with Ontario high school where he will act as head basketball coach.

Jarrett inked his contract with the Ontario school Monday and will take over his duties there this fall.

In addition to coaching basketball he may also take over track and act as frosh-soph football coach.

Jarrett came to Nyssa in September of 1955. His basketball team placed fourth in the league and baseball team ended up in the cellar. In addition to coaching Jarrett had charge of an extensive physical education program in which all the classes took part.

The mentor, who was graduated from Central Washington College of Education is married and has four daughters.

He will still be in charge of the city recreation program which will get underway next week.

Jarrett explained that his primary reason for leaving is that the Ontario school will move up to the A-1 bracket in competition and he feels the move is a step forward.

Using flatfish exclusively they trolled for rainbows and in two hours Saturday had their limit. They were within nine of their limit Sunday when the storm forced them to quit.

The fish ran from eight to 12 inches. According to Kohl the reservoir was poisoned two years ago and restocked with rainbows last year which accounted for the uniform size of most of the fish caught.

"Often all three of us had rainbows on the line at the same time but we only tangled twice," said Kohl who added, "I've never seen fish hit plugs so hard as they did last weekend."
