

Garden Club Convention Stage Set; 500 Expected For Opening Sunday

The 29th annual convention of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs will convene at Ontario Sunday with an anticipated 500 women in attendance from Oregon and neighboring states.

The Moore hotel will be headquarters for the convention with registration scheduled for 1 p.m. followed by a state board meeting at 6 p.m. and reception at 8 o'clock. Mrs. Mark Hartley, Nyssa will present special music.

The Monday session will open at 9:15 a.m. with group singing led by Mrs. L. W. Franks, Redmond, past president of the federation. Tom Sallee, Nyssa Eagle Scout will lead the flag salute and Rev. Wayne Metz will give the invocation preceding the business meeting. Mrs. Hartley will sing the convention theme song and address of welcome will be given by Ontario's mayor, Earl Bopp and Mrs. George Schweizer, district director of the garden clubs and general chairman of the convention.

Monday Special Features

Oriental culture will be featured at the Monday noon luncheon and program. The Japanese Matron's club will present a program beginning at 2:30. At 3:30 Betty Penson, Women's editor of the Idaho Statesman will talk on "Keeping Programs from dying out," and at 4 p.m. a Japanese garden tea will be held at the home of Mrs. Theo Moore, Ontario.

A dinner meeting is scheduled for 6 p.m. in the Moore hotel followed at 7:30 by a two-hour lecture and demonstration on "Keys to Success on Flower Arranging" by Jack Daniels, chairman of the department at San Mateo College, California. The public is invited to attend this program which will be held in the Ontario high school auditorium with a small admission charge for those not registered for the convention.

Special music at this time will include selections by the Emblem club chorus, Ontario and the Parma men's chorus.

The Tuesday session will open at 9:30 with group singing, invocation by the Rev. Paul Ludlow of Nyssa Methodist church, then a business meeting. At 11 o'clock Dr. Phillip Pope of Whitman College will give an illustrated lecture on "Wild Flowers of Our Region."

The Basque theme will be featured at the Tuesday noon luncheon followed by a Basque festival of music and dances. Dr. Pope will be featured again at 2:30 for a lecture on "Birds of the Region." With another business meeting scheduled for 2:20.

The convention will conclude with a 7 p.m. banquet and program. Awards will be presented during the banquet and special music rendered by Mrs. Tom Nishitani, Mrs. Dwight Wyckoff and Mrs. Herb Fisher, all of Nyssa. Mrs. Al Quast will be organist for the various events.
