An Exclusive Privilege To Gripe

This is the first announcement of the formation of the GPE & PTF, an organization that will have exclusive privileges not granted to rank and file school patrons, parents and taxpayers such as giving the school board sage advice, finding fault with expenditures and taxes, criticizing the faculties and in general lambasting modern education.

The alphabetical title is taken from the more formal name, Guardian(s) of Public Education and Protectors of Tax Funds.

As nearly as we can ascertain, we were the only person, not connected with the school, to cast a ballot at the annual school election Monday. A telephone call from the school about 4 p.m. left no doubt that we were expected!

As we see it, there are five members and a clerk of the school board, so each of them and their wives should have cast ballots for a total of 12. Then there's the high school secretary, who was making telephone calls for voters, to bring to 14 the number of votes if she was able to persuade her husband to go to the polls. Sitting for several hours in the official capacity of an election board were five women, four of whom probably voted along with their husbands. The fifth election official is the wife of a school board member, so both already have been counted. This brings the total obligatory vote to 22 and a total of only 23 votes were cast, so it is evident that we were the only "outsider" to enter the inner sanctum on school election day.

Since those who did not vote Monday will have nothing to say for the next year in regard to school affairs, it might get a little dull when conversations lag should someone slip and mention the school system.

Thank goodness this is a general election year with other choice issues that can be discussed to fill the void resulting from no school talk.
