## Nyssa Downs Homedale Nine 7-5 In 11 Inning Border League Game

Nyssa fought Homedale and the weather for 11 innings Tuesday night in a Border League game played at Homedale, coming through with a two-run rally at the top of the 11th to notch their first victory, 7-5.

In the meantime at Boise, Payette battled the home team to a 4-4 tie in a game called due to rain at the end of the 11th inning there. Weiser and Nampa were washed off the schedule.

Payette will be seen in action here Friday night when they tangle with Nyssa at the high school field at 8:30 p.m.

Nyssa, displaying a 12-hit attack which included three doubles and two triples fought back three times to take the game. Homedale surged ahead with a 3-run first inning with Nyssa knotting the score in the 3rd with two runs after scoring one in the second.

Homedale again moved ahead but Snider's triple with a runner

aboard knotted the score. At the top of the 11th doubles by Simianer and Pounds drove in two runs for the victory.

Rich Wilson made a brilliant peg to home in the eighth inning after fielding a single to catch a runner attempting to score from second which turned out to be the turning point of the game.

Cox started for Nyssa and after a shaky first inning pitched good ball. He was relieved in the ninth inning when he weakened and walked two men. Glen Marcum came in and put out the fire and received credit for the win.

Homedale was its own worst enemy in several cases, piling up an unenviable total of 13 errors during the contest. Tobler's base was not especially airtight either, being guilty of six misplays.

Nyssa's manager announced that new players are being tried out to strengthen the team and he expects to have the club really rolling when Nyssa meets Payette Friday night.

Tobler has scheduled two practice games with Burns, the first to be played there July 1.

The team will play Emmett at Emmett this Sunday evening at 8:30 in a make-up league game that was washed out here Tuesday.

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## Swim Program By Red Cross Starts Monday

The Red Cross swimming program will get under way Monday, June 25 and will continue through July 6 according to Bill Jarrett, recreation director.

A bus will leave the city park at 8:30 a.m. Those under 12 will pay 15c for the pool and 10c for the bus trip. Those over 12 years will be charged 25c at the pool in addition to bus fare.

To date 185 have signed up for the summer program with 85 of these taking advantage of the Tuesday-Thursday trips to the swimming pool. This activity is in addition to the Red Cross program. Buses for the afternoon sessions on Tuesday and Thursday leave the park at 1:00 p.m.

## Catfish Trapping Action Explained By Commission

W. C. Lightfoot, regional supervisor for the Southeast region of the State game commission at the Hines office called the Journal this week to explain the action of the commission in trapping channel catfish in the Owyhee river, an action which has stirred up considerable controversy in this area.

The necessity for the action was traced back to action by the commission which last fall rehabilitated the middle fork of the Malheur river above Warm Springs in which there was nothing but rough fish, meaning no fishing in the area.

The fish and wildlife body also poisoned the Silvies river to eradicate carp.

"We are restocking the streams," said Lightfoot, "and both are most suitable for channel catfish and small mouth bass."

"Unfortunately there are no hatcheries in Western U. S. where such fish can be obtained. There is a well established population of small mouth bass and channel catfish in the Snake and tributaries and this provides the closest source from which to obtain the fish."

"We are undertaking a limited program for catching brood fish for restocking in the middle fork of the Malheur and we are restocking above the Warm Springs reservoir."

"Only 58 cats have been caught to date and the total number will not exceed a few hundred. This will in no way affect the supply of fish in the Snake river," Lightfoot concluded.

## Favorable Potato Market, Slightly Less Volume Predicted by Growers

Malheur county potato growers predict a favorable market, but less than normal volume from the 1956 crop, according to review of the situation by Malheur County Potato Growers' association.

Plantings in all districts in the county, as summarized by association president Earl Winegar from reports of directors in each district, add up to 10 percent less acreage than one year ago and compare with acreage planted in 1954 at about 10,000 acres. Crop condition is reported generally as below average for this time of year, due mostly to the slow start made by early plantings this spring.

In considering each variety grown here, the association points out there is considerably less acreage planted to bliss triumph, because of marketing difficulties last year. Crop condition of the triumph is generally good, with the exception of some fields planted with seed lots carrying excessive virus disease.

The white rose acreage is reported as down slightly from a year ago, due to shortage and high cost of seed supplies. Crop condition in the white rose plantings point to a sharp reduction in the average yield for this variety. Extension Agent Turner Bond reported to the June 6 meeting that most white rose fields planted to seed grown and stored in the local area have shown symptoms of extended dormancy. Stands have emerged slowly and unevenly, and have suffered from soil fungus organisms, to the extent that yield prospects for these fields are below normal.

Russett acreage has shown some increase over the 1955 crop, partly because of increased acreages contracted for processing. Crop condition of the Russetts is average, except for a few plantings of seed showing virus disease. A cold planting season, combined with drying winds while

fields were being prepared, has led to some seed decay and thin stands in plantings of the Russet variety.

A relatively new variety, the early gem, has been increased in local plantings this year. Condition of these plantings is good, and the crop should be ready for market soon after triumphs are ready. Acreage devoted to this variety is not large; as growers are still experimenting with it.

The growers association reviewed figures on production in other districts and present prices for the potato crop being marketed in California. They feel in view of the smaller crop of summer potatoes being grown, and the fact that the California crop is cleaning up rapidly at good prices, that local growers can expect good market demand for their crop.

## Phyllis Cheldelin Awarded Scholarship

Miss Phyllis Cheldelin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Orland Cheldelin of Nyssa is one of the thirteen students at Oregon State College who received renewals of full-tuition scholarships for the 1956-57 school year according to word received from the college.

The scholarships awarded by the Oregon Congress of parents and teachers are to encourage young people to select elementary teaching as a career. The renewals are made on a year-to-year basis to students who qualify, and the winners of the award must continue a full-time program in elementary education and must have high scholarship. All of the renewals this year went to Oregon students.

Miss Cheldelin received a similar award for the school year just completed. She is a graduate of Nyssa high school.
