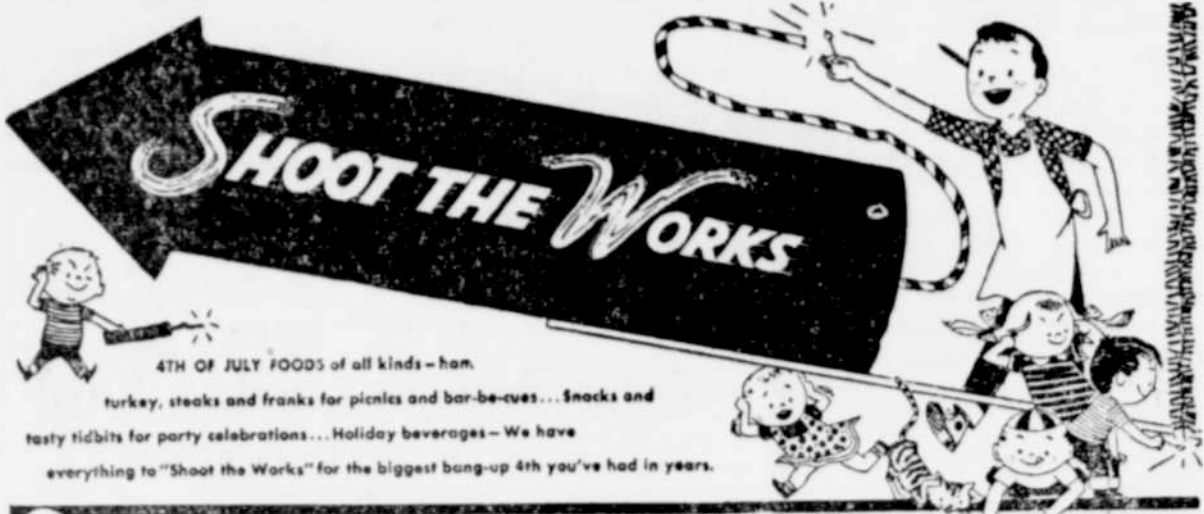

Long, Fruitful Record Left By Civic Club Which Bows to Other Groups

The Nyssa Civic club, women's service group which was organized in 1928, is being dissolved following a decision of members and the executive staff, it was announced after their June meeting last Wednesday afternoon.

Activities of the club which have been many and varied in the interests of civic betterment during its 28 years of existence have been gradually absorbed by other organizations. Its members have found constant conflicts in planning and attending monthly meetings as they are busied with many other civic, service and social club activities falling within the same scope as Civic club.

Outstanding Year

Under the presidency of Mrs. Duane Holcomb the June meeting marked the close of a successful year highlighted by many civic accomplishments. The club allocated \$250 from matured bonds to purchase materials for city park, to be constructed by play ground equipment for the Nyssa high school class.

They purchased materials for 16 swings constructed in four units for the Nyssa labor camp, completed organization of the Nyssa Newcomers which became self-sustaining early this year.

canvassed the Nyssa area for the Red Cross drive under the direction of Rev. Ludlow, assisted with the Heart Fund drive; raised approximately \$80 for March of Dimes from a benefit social and contributed \$30 to a Girl Scout troop.

More than \$100 was raised at the annual fall style show sponsored by the group for civic benefit and members assisted with the mass gamma globulin program last fall and numerous other projects where the need for their aid arose.

The remaining funds in the treasury will be held to invest in a civic project to be determined by the present executive group.

Opinions Requested

With the disbanding of the Civic club has come the question of whether to continue with plans for the annual fashion show for civic benefits which had been scheduled for Sept. 19. Hundreds of women attend this yearly event which features display of the latest styles from Nyssa's own stores.

The executive board left the decision up to this year's style show chairman, Mrs. Gene Grasty and her committee, Mmes. Grant

Organized in 1928

The Civic club was created in 1928 in response to an advertisement placed in the local paper by several civic minded women inviting all who were interested in civic work to meet at a designated place and time. The organization was perfected with a Mrs. Swan named president, Mrs. Hil-da Tensen, vice president and a membership of from 10 to 15. Mrs. Tensen acted as president during the major part of the year after Mrs. Swan moved away and served a following term.

At least four charter members still reside in Nyssa, Mrs. Tensen, Mrs. H. R. Sherwood, Mrs. Peter Tensen and Mrs. Lillian Newby.

Credited to the club's accomplishments in the early years were the establishment of a city park which one member recalls involving a several year's struggle in getting trees to grow and coping with many other complexities. They had a drinking fountain installed on Main street, sponsored Girl and Boy Scout troops, raised \$100 per year for the city library and gave dinners in cooperation with the chamber of commerce as they entertained federal representatives visiting here in the interests of starting construction of Owyhee dam.

The Civic club sponsored the annual teacher's receptions now given by the PTA, and flower show which is now taken care of by the three Garden clubs in the Nyssa community.

Size Regulations Recommended By Spud Growers

Maturity and minimum size regulations for the 1956 potato crop were recommended last Friday for enforcement under the potato marketing agreement, according to Turner Bond, county extension agent. The control committee for the market agreement area covering Idaho and Malheur county met Friday in Caldwell to formulate recommendations to the secretary of agriculture to be made effective on the crop to be marketed between now and Sept. 20.

Marketing rules as recommended by the committee require that round red potatoes must be 1 7/8" minimum diameter and must have not more than 10 percent of the potatoes with over half the skin missing or feathered. No grade under U. S. No. 2 can be shipped, but U. S. No. 1 size B can be shipped in a separate container from the larger sizes.

Long white varieties must be No. 2 grade or better, and must meet a minimum size of 1 7/8" minimum diameter, size A. Maturity standard for long white was recommended at a 20 percent tolerance for potatoes with more than half the skin missing or feathered. No size B can be shipped in the long white varieties.

Russets must be No. 2 or better grade, with a minimum size of 2" diameter, size A. Maturity on the russet provides a 10 percent tolerance for potatoes with more than half the skin missing.

Size B was not recommended for russets. Lawren King of Ontario attended the committee session as representative of the Malheur growers.

The proposed regulations will become binding if approved by the secretary of agriculture, and will then become the minimum standards to be met by all potato shipments from the marketing agreement area.
