Nyssa Moves Into Fourth Place; Wilson Stops Wilder With 1-Hitter

After dropping last Friday's game to Payette 11-4, the Nyssa Sugarbeets struck back with authority Sunday and Tuesday to defeat Emmett 14-4 Sunday night and Wilder 13-2 Tuesday night in a game which was the outstanding effort of the Nyssa men to date.

The double win moved the Sugarbeets into fourth spot in the league which is led by undefeated Boise and Payette with Weiser holding third spot.

Tuesday night's game with Wilder was the most spectacular yet played with top honors going to Dick Wilson who pitched and batted his team to the lopsided win. Dick had a no-hitter going with one out in the ninth inning when Paulson drove the ball out of the park for a homerun. In addition to his airtight pitching, Wilson pounded out two homers and two singles in five times at bat, a fair night's work.

Wilson had powerful offense support Tuesday as Nyssa pounded out 15 hits, scoring in every inning but the first. A good example of the Nyssa power was shown in the 4-run third inning. Hale singled, Schenk homered and Wilson duplicated his effort. Pounds added to Gooding's misery with a resounding triple.

Nyssa was also tight defensively with both the infield and outfield contributing sparkling plays which drew applause from the good crowd that turned out to

see the Beetmen win their first home game.

Sunday at Emmett Gerald Cox hurled for Nyssa and turned in a 4-hit effort. The lefty was "on" and had the game under control all the way. In the meantime Nyssa kept home plate warm, scoring in every inning but the fifth. Simianer and Wilson led the Nyssa attack with three hits each.

Friday night Nyssa played Payette here and had the game in their pocket throughout the first seven innings, holding a 4-1 lead at that stage with Marcum working smoothly.

In the eighth inning the Payette team came to life when Marcum weakened, the infield piled error on error and 14 Payette players came to bat, pushing over nine runs.

Cox, who replaced Marcum in the disastrous eighth was treated just as roughly as Marcum. Ballard, Payette pitcher cooled off the already wilted Beetmen in the eighth and ninth, striking out the side in the last frame.

Friday night Nyssa will play Weiser here at 8:30 p. m. at the high school field in a battle for third spot in the league standings.
