5 Years Ago—June 28, 1951

Rev. John L. Briehl of Wisconsin will be installed as pastor of Faith Lutheran Church July 1 by Dr. S. C. Siefkes of Portland.

Lynn Ray, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Ray, will leave July 6 for Austria to attend international jamboree of Boy Scouts. Archie Moses, route 1, Nyssa, is offering to donate 2-acres of land on his farm as a memorial to the pioneers, according to Walter Meacham of Portland, executive secretary of Old Oregon Trail, Inc. It was on Mr. Moses' farm that emigrants of 1860 who were attacked by Indians, made their starvation camp and resorted to cannibalism before they were rescued by the U. S. Army under Captain Dent.

10 Years Ago—June 27, 1946

Lee Dail has resigned as temporary mail carrier on route 2. Jess Haroldson will be the new carrier. Leo Myers of Emmett has purchased Main's Cleaners from Cliff Main. The 513 German prisoners and their guards left the Nyssa camp Sunday for New York City where they will board a ship bound for Germany. The Germans have been prisoners from 3 to 4 years.

15 Years Ago—June 26, 1941

The City Planning Board approved the proposed improvement of the city water works and of the city council to finance the job through bonds to be paid out of the water revenue. Voters of Nyssa were urged to turn out Monday and vote on the issuance of \$13,000 in water revenue bonds, by City Attorney A. L. Fletcher. A. C. Sallee was elected for a five year term as director of Union High school. C. C. Wyckoff, Nyssa farmer was elected chairman of the board.

20 Years Ago—June 25, 1936

The Nyssa post office is to close on Saturday afternoon starting this week according to a bulletin received by Postmaster Goshert. The Nyssa Pharmacy has installed a new fountain. The temperature reached 105 degrees in Nyssa

Monday, 100 Tuesday and a cool 96 Wednesday. Harold Anderson was stung on the eyeball by a bee while riding in a car. Dr. Sarazin removed the stinger along with part of the bee's wing.

25 Years Ago—June 25, 1931

Nyssa's classy baseball nine won the 1931 pennant in the Idaho-Oregon league. Burglars robbed the Holly Bros. store in Adrian of between \$400 and \$500 worth of drygoods, groceries and sporting goods. They entered by breaking a glass in the door. Sixty planes enroute from Nampa to Burns flew over Malheur county this week. They were on tour of air circus at various cities.

30 Years Ago—June 25, 1926

Jack and Charley McConnell went to Steep Mountain this week where they have several bands of sheep. Mrs. Victor Marshall is the proud owner of an Oldsmobile coupe. Work has begun on the new stockyards to be located at the end of the "Y" on the Homedale branch.

40 Years Ago—June 30, 1916

The Rust farm near Mitchell Butte will be the place for a picnic July 4, celebrated by the Kingman Colony community. The L. Spier store is advertising mens socks 6 pair for 60c, and shirts for 50c each. Mrs. Tom Adams suffered a painful injury last Thursday when a sturgeon hook caught in her wrist while in the act of throwing out into the Snake river in Whitley Bottom. The two railroad bridges near Nyssa have been guarded day and night since the threatened war with Mexico. Mexican section hands have been dismissed.

45 Years Ago—June 29, 1911

The Oregon Short Line is unloading a large quantity of railroad ties at Nyssa to be used in the construction work on the Nyssa-Buhl extension. Policeman W. W. Smith has been working a gang of hoboes on the streets this week. Since railroad work started they have become a nuisance. The high water

Several good books for summer reading top the list of books going into circulation at the Malheur County Library.

Two of them take the reader to far points of the globe. Tonga; A Tale of the Friendly Islands is Patricia Ledyard's impressions of island customs and people in Tonga in the South Pacific where she went to head a mission school, married, and made her home. The Antarctic Challenged by Edward Mountevans is a history of the Antarctic and of each exploring expedition.

In lighter vein J. P. McEvoy's articles are collected under the title Charlie Would Have Loved This which is also the name of the first item in the book; and Harlan Miller's newspaper columns and features from "Ladies Home Journal" are now together in one book titled There's A Man In the House.

Nila is a book about Nila Magidoff, Russian wife of an NBC commentator, and her impressions of America; her own life in Russia included work in the Russian Merchant Marine, Siberian exile, teaching hygiene and folk-singing in remote areas, and journalism in Moscow.

The Sun and its Influence by Mervyn Ellison describes the structure and characteristic activity of the sun and explains such natural occurrences as the aurora borealis, sunburn, and sunspots.

Unfinished Business by Halford Luccock contains "short diversions on religious themes" that have also been styled "sermons in embryo."
