Everyone is cordially invited. Come and Bring Your Friends to hear the Gospel as we believe in speaking where the Bible speaks and being silent where the Bible is silent.

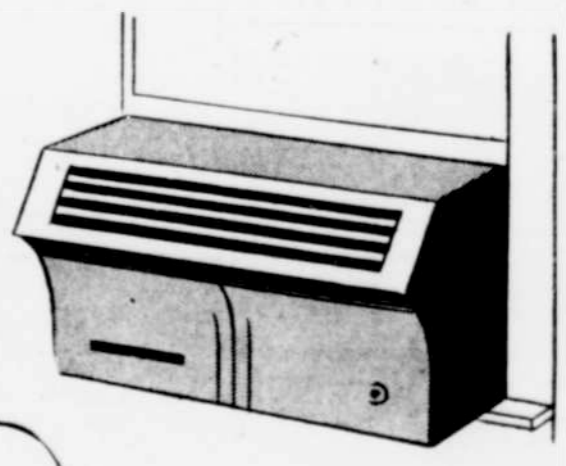
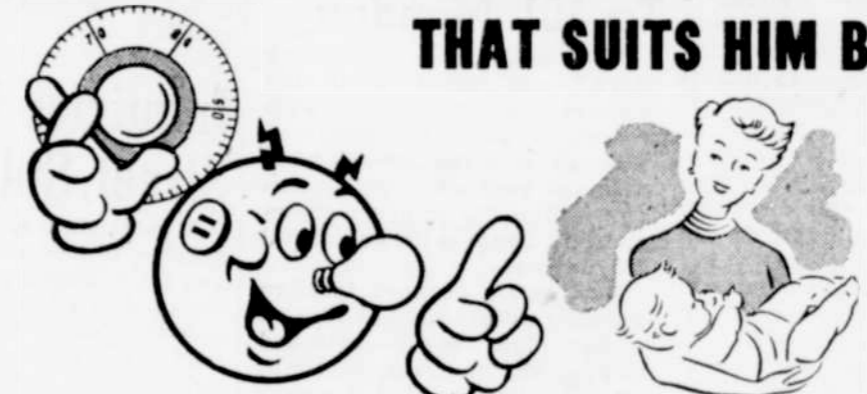
