Sugarbeet Bunts Bop Boise Boys To Move Nyssa Into Title Contention

The Nyssa Sugarbeets Sunday moved within a game of first place when they bunted Boise crazy to take a 9 to 5 decision over the until then defeated Idaho club.

Ray Barnes, pitching for the Sugarbeets gave up nine scattered hits but had the game under control all the way although sloppy support in the eighth and ninth at third base gave him some anxious moments.

Boise got off to a one-run lead in the first when Peterson drove in Talbot who had reached first on an error.

The Beets struck back in the second inning scoring two runs. Pounds was safe on an error. Barnes singled, Herron sacrificed and Holcomb singled to account for the scores.

The score zoomed to five in the third when Schenk, Wilson and Pounds singled or bunted safely and Herron produced the final run scoring single to add three to the scoreboard.

The Sugarbeets sweetened their lead in the sixth scoring four runs on two bases on balls, a sacrifice, single and error.

A single followed by a double gave Boise a tally in the seventh. They scored twice in the eighth aided by three Nyssa bobbles and but one base blow.

Boise scored their final run in the ninth, again aided by a Nyssa miscue.

Nyssa had a good day at the plate with every man on the team but Snider collecting at least one safety.

Barnes, quite a hitting pitcher got 3 for 5, Wilson 3 for 6 and Pounds 2 for 4 to lead the attack. The Beets made quite a switch in their usually long-ball attack.

There wasn't a hit worth more than one base. But they came at the right time.
