The city of Nyssa has discontinued the chlorination of the city water with the sanction of the state board of health according to City Manager E. K. Burton.

10 Years Ago—July 11, 1946

Reed Ray, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Ray was awarded the rank of Eagle Scout. 11,300 crows and magpies have been killed by boys during the campaign conducted in the county by the Malheur Game League. About half of the killings were reported at Nyssa. Prices of potatoes were \$1.20 to the grower here. La Verl Anderson and Ruby Lou Hite of Nyssa, were stalked by a cougar last week in the mountains near Haines, while Mr. Hite was cutting poles for the Idaho Power Co.

COUNTY LIBRARY

Books for general reading make up the greater share of the books going into circulation Saturday, July 11, at Malheur County Library.

Remember the House is a first novel by Santha Rama Rau about a young girl in modern India who samples the influence of the western world but finds fulfillment in her own people's traditions.

Adam with Arrows is an account by Colin Simpson about native tribes of New Guinea that still live in a primitive world where cannibalism and sorcery are practiced.

The Horse Soldiers is a novel of the Civil War by Harold Sinclair, telling of daring cavalry operations during a seventeen-day raid.

Ivan Sanderson writes a history of whaling describing the whale's habits and those of its hunters in Follow the Whale.

Jeopardy is a novel by Manfred Conte about an almost perfect counterfeiter, his narrow escapes and fleeting loves.

Americans by Choice by Angelo Pellegrini presents the stories of six Italian immigrants who left their homeland in the early years of this century and chose to make America their homes.

Hannah Fowler by Janice Giles is a novel about pioneer life in the Kentucky wilderness.

A Bar of Shadow by Laurens Van Der Post is a small but significant novel in which the love of one enemy for another is the theme as two men review their life in a Japanese prisoner-of-war camp.

How to Write a Story and Sell It by Adela Rogers St. Johns is a book of practical information based upon forty years' experience.

The Book of Poisons by Gustav Schenk explores the origins, uses, and misuses of the world's deadly poisons, highlighting its texts with factual case histories.

China: New Age and New Outlook by Ping-chia Kuo outlines China's movement toward Communism and appraises its place in the world.

A Sketch of Sam Bass, the Bandit by Charles Martin is an account of the career of a notorious Texas outlaw of the 1870's.

Angel of the Battlefield is a life of Clara Barton, the woman who founded the American Red Cross. Its author is Isabel Ross, who also wrote "Rebel Rose" and "Proud Kate."

Harold Quigley and John Turner present a study and evaluation of Japan's postwar political developments in The New Japan. Celebrated American Cave edited by Charles Mohr and Howard Sloane describes famous caves and also goes into such subjects as cave diving, problems of ice and bats, and flora, fauna, and geology.

Herbert Axelrod and Leonard Schultz catalog the small fishes in Handbook of Tropical Aquarium Fishes, giving details of their culture and including a chapter on fish diseases as well as aquarium plants.

The Dice of God by Hoffman Birney is a novel based on Custer's famous battle of the Little Big Horn.
