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Give Credit Where It's Due

We hope last week's report from the district attorney's office about cracking down on juvenile delinquents doesn't frighten the public into thinking teen-agers and juveniles are running rampant in Malheur county.

Crimes committed by juveniles are a fraction of one percent of the total. This is borne out by Robert L. Kriner, county juvenile officer, who places all the blame in the homes where there is lack of training and negligence on the part of parents to cooperate with their children and with public authorities.

It might be well to take a look at the law referred to in last week's announcement that a curfew will be enforced and study the section holding the parent, guardian or other person having care and custody of a minor responsible for their violations.

Look around Nyssa, or any other town in the area, and you'll find children, high school youths and graduates gainfully employed. Few of them seem to be afraid of work as is indicated by the hundred pound sacks of potatoes being heaved around at the packing houses and the business-like manner in which they are handling other jobs. Various stores and businesses have hired high school students and graduates to help out during the summer or on a trial training basis and most of their records are good. Dozens of others are engaged in heavy work on the farms of their parents and employers.

Reports that swimming pools, recreation centers and special programs are necessary "to keep youths in line" don't ring true since this community's youths seem to be able to create their own recreation, just like most of the adults in a rural community.

We'll probably have a swimming pool in Nyssa someday, and chances are the youths and juveniles will contribute as much to its reality as anyone else.

The marvelous records of kids in their 4-H work, FHA, Boy and Girl Scouts, church work, lodges and other activities are not given nearly as much verbal publicity as the "juvenile problem."

We'll still place a good bet on our youngsters who will be tomorrow's leaders and make us ashamed of the records we have made in handling local, state and national problems.

Our Senators' Influence

Defeat of the Hells Canyon bill in the U. S. Senate last week should put a damper on the unnecessary and often exaggerated propaganda that has been flowing through the mails and over the air about this political vehicle that has failed to arouse most residents of the lower Snake river valley.

What about Sen. Wayne Morse and Sen. Richard Neuberger? Most of their press releases have dealt with castigation of their opponents and implications that only those who have been "bought" or are ignorant would favor construction of three dams by a private power concern.

Their spheres of influence in the U. S. Senate seem to be less than they would have their constituents believe, if the 51 to 41 vote in the Senate can be used as a criterion.

Sen. Morse will have to go back to his speeches and press releases about breadlines and Sen. Neuberger will have to revert to his remarks about squirrels on the White House lawn and makeup for political TV speakers.

At least, there is hope that this area will have more power within a short time instead of waiting until Congress sees fit to appropriate more than a half billion dollars of our tax money to construct a high dam and its feeder lines.

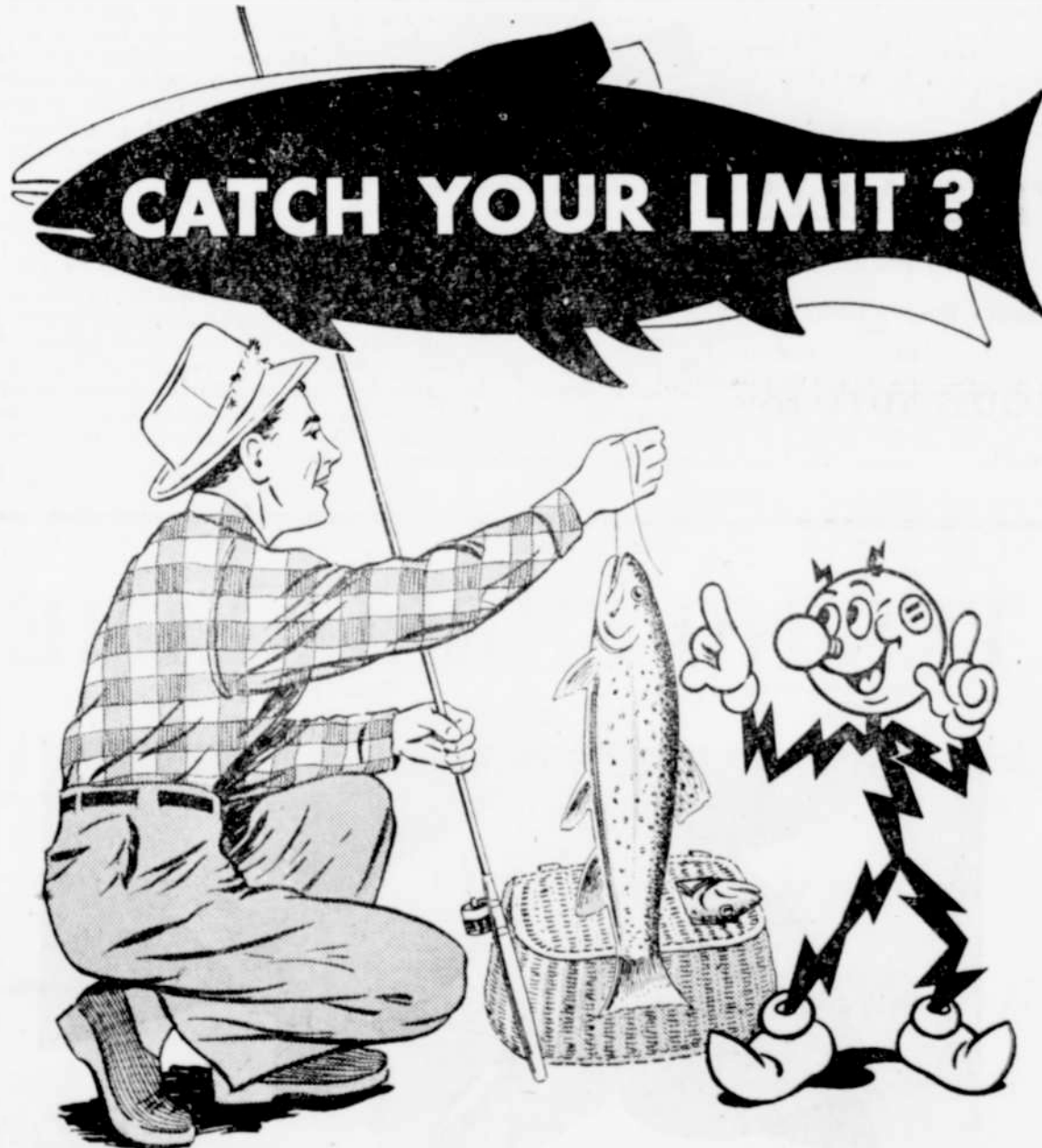

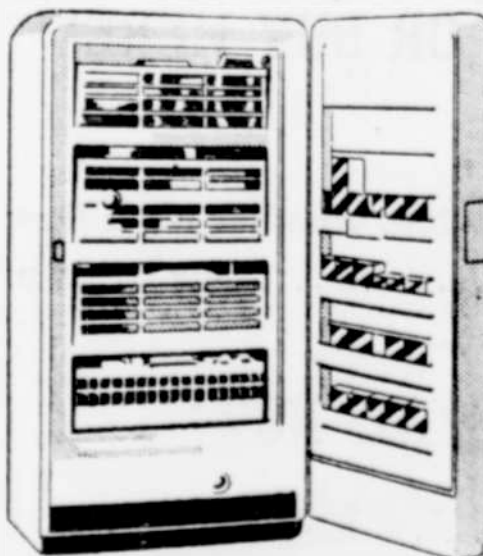
