The Arabian stallion, Wisok, owned by Neal Dimmick, Nyssa, won top honors, the blue ribbon, at the annual Boise horse show last week. The animal was one of several Arabians captured by Gen. Patton from the Germans which were shipped to this country. — Fifteen tons of hay were destroyed by fire Monday at the Klaas Tensen farm.

Dr. Albert Steward, curator of the OSC herbarium, will be at the camp to help boys learn to identify various range plants and grasses. Boys will get actual practice in camping, fishing, hunting, and care of out-door equipment from Andy Landforce, OSC wildlife management specialist. John Clouston of the U. S. forest service, Portland, will give talks at the camp on the range management society and the work of the forest service.

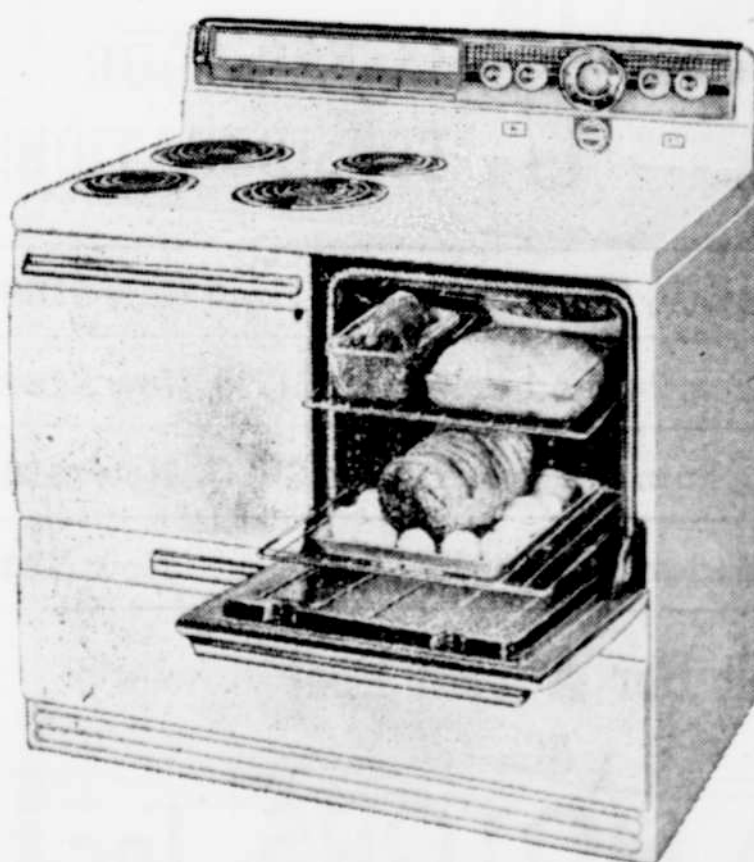
