

Missionary Tells Of Life, Scenery On Tour of India

Note: This is the second chapter of experience written by Miss Frances Foster on her recent 10 months' world tour which included two months spent in Tokyo, six months in India and visits to Pakistan; Beirut, Lebanon; the Holy Land; Turkey, Rome and London.

The trip from Tokyo to Calcutta was a pleasant one by B.O.A.C. plane, refueling at Okinawa, Hong Kong and Rangoon and finally landing at Dum Dum airport in Calcutta in less than 24 hours from the time we left Tokyo.

The bus trip from the airport was an interesting experience. One can see all the activities of life performed on the streets. Two outstanding differences between India and Japan are the manner of walk and of dress. While the people of Japan carry everything on their backs, here they carry everything on their heads, even to large pieces of furniture. Because of this the people here are not stooped as in Japan, but straight. There is also an aimlessness about their walk which is somewhat characteristic of their nature. Children, adults or animals may wander across the street any place at any time or even recline there. At night the streets of Calcutta are filled with sleeping people.

In Japan most of the people have adopted the western style of dress, while here nearly everyone has retained their native costume, characteristic of their area and religion.

Yes, India is progressing and happy in her freedom, but the many generations of heathen darkness and superstition cannot be changed overnight.

We visited at Kharagpur, a railroad center 60 miles from Calcutta and attended a convention along with the Kharagpur people. Here we were privileged to get a glimpse of the gospel work being done on this border area as well as to see the rare beauties. Nestled high in the Himalayan mountains is Kalimpong the trading post for Nepal and Tibet. The sky was clear and blue allowing one to see for miles into these vast ranges. The huge poinsettias, chrysanthemums and other bright flowers were blooming profusely. Amid the green trees the tinkle of bells were heard, worn by many goats. The bright clothing worn by those tending them, as well as other Nepalis and Tibetans lent color and beauty to the scene.

Let me take you now to the most northern state of India which is Kashmir. Erinagar, the capitol, is the vacationer's wonderland in the summertime. However, it is winter now and the thick haze prevents one from seeing the high snow capped mountains surrounding this fertile valley high in the Himalayas. This is predominately a Moslem area and has been the source of much dispute between Pakistan and India.

These poor people suffer from the cold from November to April, wearing long full coats. Underneath they carry a small charcoal pot to prevent them from freezing. Often their abdomens are badly burned by these.
