

Mail Collection Time From Street Boxes Discussed

A change in time for pickup of mail from a drop-box at the corner of Main and South First, at the former postoffice location, is not possible at this time, it was reported by Postmaster Lloyd Lewis after several requests were made for a change in time of mail collection.

Last pickup of mail from the Main street box is 3:45 p.m. which causes delay in later posting of letters for west-bound train 17 which arrives here at 5:17 p.m., as well as west-bound train 11 which arrives here at 7:11 p.m. Collection is made in the morning too late for distribution for rural delivery that day, Lewis said.

The postmaster explained that time of collection of mail from drop boxes is arranged to coincide with city carriers' schedules and to change pickup time to meet out-going trains and rural carriers would necessitate an additional substitute carrier or overtime for regular carriers.

Regulations require that in either instance, a person hired for even a few minutes extra work must be credited with two hours of duty, it was explained.

Spud Shipments Continue High: Wednesday Slow

Potato shipments slowed up Wednesday after 1,543 cars had left Nyssa by Tuesday night, for a total of 367 cars since last week at the same time. U. P. Agent Tom Jones said the market slowed all Nyssa and Adrian operations Wednesday when about 30 cars were expected.

This year's 1,543 cars compares with 407 that had left Nyssa at the same time last year. Two years ago the total shipped by Aug. 14 was 1,458 and the year's total was 2,472 cars for the highest record in history.

Movement of onions is still somewhat slow although 25 cars of this year's crop have left the Nyssa station and none had been shipped from here a year ago at this time. Eight cars were shipped Tuesday. Shippers reported that the market is quoting a good price, but what is termed an "unusual" situation was said to exist this week with fewer buyers than usual. The situation was said to be "strictly temporary."

Tongue Gashed In Public Brawl

A fight in a local tavern Sunday put S. V. Holloway in the hospital and Jim Coleman and Leola Coleman in jail. The fracas allegedly started during a game of cards with Holloway suffering a severe gash at the bottom and top of his tongue, requiring stitches on both sides. According to police, Holloway probably would have lost his entire tongue if he had had all his teeth in the first place. Additional teeth were lost in the fight.

Each of the Colemans were charged with disorderly conduct and fined \$35 each and confined to the city jail.

9 Truck Scales Found Faulty Of 42 Checked

Ten truck scales were condemned for repair out of 45 checked for accuracy in Malheur and Harney counties, it was announced by the state department of agriculture's weights and measures division.

Max Burns, state weights and measures inspector, conducted the inspection during July. He tested heavy duty truck scales with weight capacities of 15 to 50 tons. These scales are used in weighing trucks which transport fruit, grain, lumber and livestock. Three truck scales were checked in Harney county, with one condemned. Of Malheur county's 42 truck scales, nine were condemned for repair.
