"Some Inner Fury" is a novel of modern India by Kamala Taylor writing under the pseudonym of Markandaya.

"The Threshold" is a picture of a small girl's world, a story by Dorothea Rutherford translated from the German.

Stories of supreme crises in the lives of great men are the subject of "High Moment" edited by Wallace Brockway.

"Robert E. Lee" by Earl Schenk Miers is one of the "great life in brief" series.

"Tinkers and Genius" by Edmund Fuller is a series of biographies of Yankee inventors from the early settlements to mid-nineteenth century and from improved water wheels to the sewing machine.

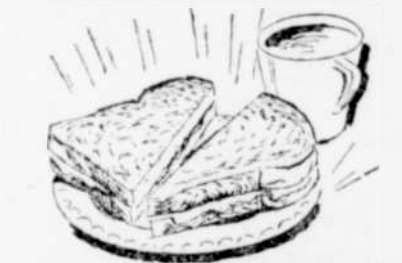

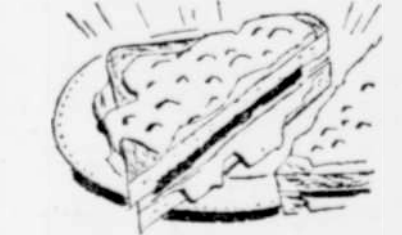

FRENCH CREAM SANDWICH 5-ounce pkg. cream cheese 1/2 cup drained, crushed pineapple (5-ounce can) 6 slices enriched bread 1 egg beaten 1/4 cup milk 1/4 dash salt 1/4 cup butter

Make sandwich filling by combining cream cheese and pineapple. Mix until creamy. Filling makes 3 sandwiches. Cut each sandwich in half diagonally. Combine egg, milk and salt in shallow dish. Dip each side of sandwich into egg mixture and brown quickly on both sides in butter. Makes 3 sandwiches.

Butter bread. On 4 slices of bread place ham, then tomato and cheese. Cover with remaining 4 slices of bread. Cut sandwiches in half and place in a 9-inch baking pan. Combine soup with milk and mix thoroughly. Pour over sandwiches. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in moderate oven (400°) 20 minutes, 4 servings.
