OF INTEREST TO OREGON VOTERS—**ARTICLE 3**

With last week's Democratic convention fresh in our minds we submit Senator Morse's most recent demonstration of opportunism.

On August 14, 1956 at the Chicago Democratic Convention, Senator Morse had this to say:

"Now I accepted the invitation of the leaders of the Democratic party both state and national to join the Democratic Party and I am very happy with my decision. For one reason, as a constitutional liberal I am no longer almost alone in my party in the senate. The Democratic Party is the party predominate with constitutional liberalism in our country today."

On July 31, 1952, discussing the same Democratic party with practically the same membership in Congress as at the present time he had this to say:

"No, I have never considered becoming a Democrat because there certainly would be no place for me in the Democratic party on the basis of the record of the Democratic party and let me tell you why. Because I do not think the Democratic party stands for a system of constitutional checks and balances in the administration of government. I think I've demonstrated over and over again that they stand for government by men rather than government by Constitutional checks." (Reporter's Round-up)

The subject of filibuster is another example of his opportunism. While a Republican, Senator Morse was a leading foe of the filibuster and voted in favor of ending anti-Civil Rights Filibusters. He denounced filibuster as a denial of Majority rule.

His 1946 views on the subject are as follows:

"Declaring he will fight the Case Bill, Morse said he opposes filibusters, either in committee or on the floor," and added:

"Delays and stalling either in the committee or on the floor, to prevent majority rule, are inimical to good government." (Quotation of Morse in Oregonian, 2-24-46 from Washington dateline AP story).

"The fundamental trick of the obstructionist is the filibuster, which the public must learn is not funny, but a disgraceful and contemptible procedure . . ." (Quotation of Sen. Morse from St. Louis Dispatch 5-6-46).

Some more of the same but more recent:

"Oh, how many times in the last eight years I have stood at my desk in the Senate and pleaded for around-the-clock sessions to break filibusters which, in my opinion, had the effect of denying human rights to men and women who ought to be free . . ." (Congressional Record, 4-24-53, Page 3751)

These views did not deter him from embarking on his infamous filibuster for 22 hours and 20 minutes, on subjects from bologna to the failure of newspapers to give adequate coverage to his speeches, requiring useless printing of 124 pages of the Congressional Record, all of which cost the taxpayers untold thousands of dollars.

After this demonstration of lack of principle, Senator Morse on 7-22-54 began another filibuster speech, which he described in these words:

"Mr. President, this is filibuster speech." (Congressional Record 7-22-54, page 11329)

Several days later, on 7-26-54 at page 11942 of the Congressional Record, Senator Morse is listed as voting against cloture. In other words he voted to permit continuation of filibuster.

A quotation of Senator Robert Kerr, Democrat, Oklahoma, appearing in the Oregonian (5-10-53) may explain the reason for Senator Morse's loss of his anti-filibuster principle.

"Senator Wayne Morse's fellow senators claim that he was 'filly-busted' into his record-breaking filibuster." About a year ago, recalls Senator Kerr, a filly-busted Morse in the jaw. The injury was so serious that Senator Morse at first could not get his mouth open.

"Now, all the other senators cannot get it shut," he says.

Probably the sharpest appraisal of Senator Morse indicating the reaction of his colleagues toward him was expressed by Congressman Sam Rayburn, Democrat of Texas, when, as chairman of the Democratic Convention, he introduced the Senator from Oregon last week with these words, "Senator Morse is always ready to speak and he is here now and wants to speak."

Should the people of Oregon be represented by a Senator without sincerity of principle who is the butt of jibes by his fellow senators, be they Democrat or Republican?
