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Bair Jersey Calf Chosen For Prize At County Fair

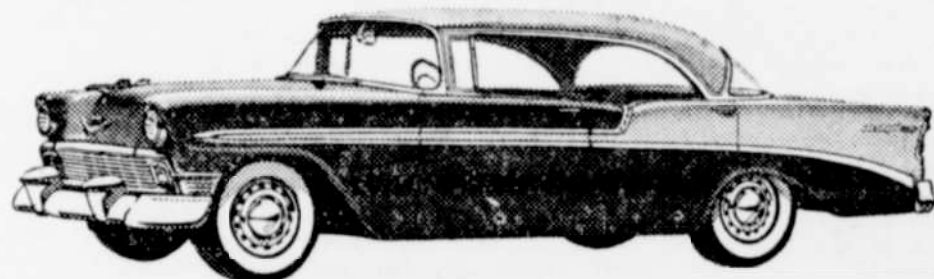

Club members have given 11 registered Jersey calves during the past eight years which came from the herds of Lew Johnson, Charley Grider, Fred Burgess, Irvin Hart and Sons, Chet Clark, Toomb and Phifer and Al Thompson and Son. Two state heifer awards have been made from this county, one in 1954 by Hope and Charley Grider and one in 1955 by Toomb and Phifer.

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
