5 Years Ago — Aug. 30, 1931

Naval reserve. — The Malheur Home Telephone Co. has installed 145 new telephones since Jan. 1, as part of its Nyssa-Adrian construction program. — Miss Donna Lee Wilson and Miss Bonnie Ward returned from Richmond, Va., Tuesday where they had attended a Job's Daughters convention.

10 Years Ago — Aug. 29, 1926

Wayne Lewis and Albert McKimney have opened the Nyssa Auto Body Shop on Bower avenue between First and Second streets. — Errett Hummel of Portland has been appointed as principal of the Nyssa high school succeeding Frank Parr, resigned. — Pat Norman and Rolland Holmes, members of the Nyssa Riding club won first and second ribbons at the Payette County Fair held at New Plymouth last week.

15 Years Ago

20 Years Ago — Aug. 27, 1916

Water, passing through the Malheur and Jacobsen Gluch siphons, reached the Dead Ox Flats, lands for the first time from the Owyhee reservoir. — The A. H. Keck pickup truck, landed in the Owyhee river near the Keck home when accidentally started by their 7-year-old son. — Mrs. George Haycock suddenly fell through an old cess pool while walking across the lawn. It was not known the cess pool was there as it was covered with boards and grass was growing over it. Mrs. Haycock was rescued by her husband and son, uninjured.

30 Years Ago — Sept. 3, 1926

Supt. and Mrs. Loren Messenger have moved into the McConnell house on Main street. The lure of bobbed hair gets them all eventually. The latest victim of the craze is Lizzie Thompson, postmaster. — Miss Lucy Thompson returned to Portland to resume teaching.

35 Years Ago — Aug. 26, 1921

Ten carloads of potatoes were sold Monday by the Potato Grow-

ers association for \$2.05 cwt. — A horse was drowned in Snake river below the railroad bridge while several animals were being driven across Snake river to Bridge Island. — The old ferry-boat which has plied between the Port of Nyssa and Bridge Island, sank to the bottom of Snake river last week leaving the residents of the island marooned except for the railroad bridge and row boats.

45 Years Ago — Aug. 31, 1911

A well sunk on the I. K. Hawk premises encountered a strong artesian flow of water and guarantees an easy and economical water system for Nyssa. — Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Gibson celebrated their silver wedding anniversary. — A crew of men with six-horse teams have been hauling bridge timbers and piling for the railroad bridge across the Owyhee river on the Nyssa-Buhl extension. — Dr. Goetz resigned as president of the Nyssa Commercial club as he is moving to Emmett. Thomas Coward was named to fill the vacancy. — The Owyhee Mercantile store, owned by Mr. Laffrenz, was entered by burglars who rifled the cash register, also taking numerous other merchandise. — E. H. McDonald is building a \$4000 home on his ranch near Nyssa.

Two novels have World War II backgrounds. "The Trumpet Unblown" by William Hoffman depicts the corrupting, disintegrating effect and the horror of war. "Not the Glory" by Pierre Boulle is a story of a German spy in England whose undoing is the aim of a code expert.

"Frozen Jungle" by Lawrence Earl tells of the fictional struggle of six survivors of a plane crash in remote Labrador to keep alive.
