MOST PROFIT OR THE CHEAPEST FEED

The following are results from a cattle feeding demonstration held at the Louisville Stock Yards in Kentucky. The cattle were divided into two lots averaging around 600 lbs. each. One lot received ground ear corn and Purina Special Steer Fatena with 5 mg. Stilbestrol. They were fed 2 lbs. Steer Fatena per head per day with all the corn and cobmeal the cattle would eat. Hay was fed for the first 32

days at the rate of 3 lbs. per head per day to both pens. They were put on feed as soon as they were put into the stock yards. Purina Livestock Mineral was fed free choice to both pens. The animals were fed for 136 days.

Both pens were composed of two Hereford heifers and eight Angus-Hereford crosses. Starting grades on the Purina lot were five commercial and five utility. The soybean lot graded nine commercial and one utility. Here are the results:
