SENATOR MORSE--AND MORE FACTS

ARTICE 6
Senator Morse, who has professed to protect the interests of the Oregon farmers, demonstrated the extent of his concern when he failed to vote on the following farm legislation:

OLEOMARGARINE

3-18-48, on Amendment to repeal Federal tax on oleo and all Federal license fees on manufacturing and selling it.

3-18-48, on amendment to repeal Federal tax on oleo and all Federal license fees on manufacturing and selling it, but retaining a 1/4c tax on oleo.

1-17-50, on measure to repeal taxes on colored oleo and prohibit sale of yellow oleo in interstate commerce.

1-18-50, on amendment to repeal or reduce oleo excise taxes.

1-18-50, on repealing tax on colored oleo and providing that it be manufactured in packages of not more than 1 lb. in weight.

PRICE SUPPORTS

6-6-50, on amendment to repeal 90% parity support of basic farm commodities.

With dairy and general farming so basic to the economy of Oregon should we have a U. S. Senator who gives lip service to our farmers and then takes no part in legislation so vital to them. Any vote, whether yes or no, would at least show he was concerned. Should we be concerned in perpetuating this lack of interest?

TRUCK TIRE TAX

Senator Morse did support and vote for Senate Bill 1048 which would have provided a 1000% increase in the tax on truck tires. (1000% is not typographical error.)

Fortunately there were more than enough members of Congress actually concerned about the people to defeat this bill but should the farmers and truckers of Oregon be saddled with a senator who either does nothing on legislation affecting their vital interests or else attempts to knife them when he does act.

While Morse's record on tax legislation, against the interests of people of Oregon as well as the nation, will be presented in a later article, Morse's stand on one tax bill bears mention at this time for the reaction in the Senate to Morse's position on any pending legislation.

On September 28, 1951, Morse, after attacking the bill and claiming it unfair, voted against the bill raising taxes to help finance the Korean war and build up defenses.

After Senator Morse had taken his stand against this legislation, with his cry of unfairness, and prior to the vote, Senator Walter George, Democrat of Georgia commented:

"I pause merely to say that I am beginning to think pretty well of this bill because of the enemies it has made."

While it may be nice for the other U. S. Senators to have a 'Morse weather vane' which indicates for them in reverse whether a proposed bill is good or bad, the people of Oregon are entitled to have as their Senator, a man who will be followed for his constructive leadership rather than a symbol of what not to do.

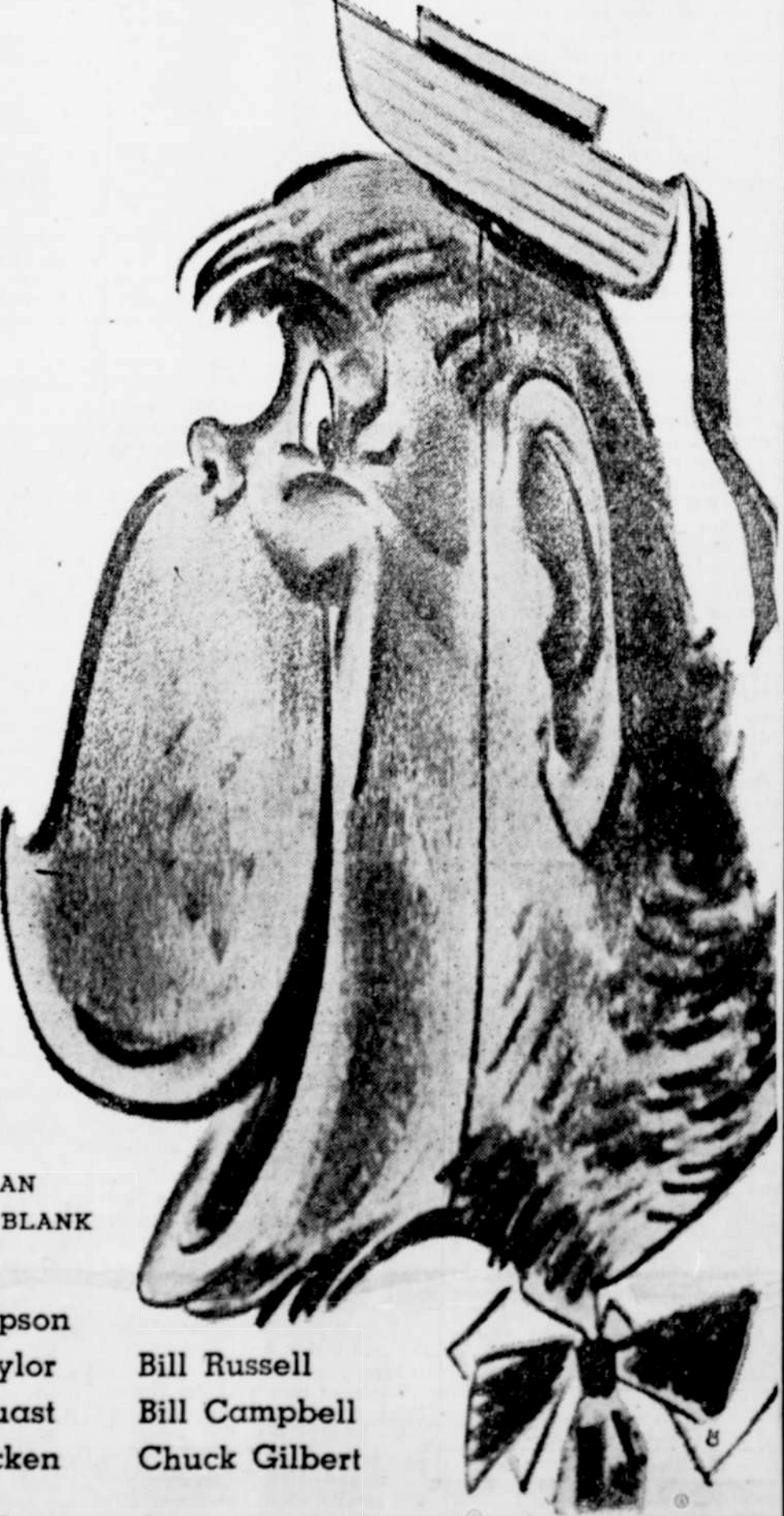
