Bulldogs Battle Burns to 12-12 Tie; Larry Schenk Lost to Nyssa Eleven

The Nyssa Bulldogs opened their season Friday in a "Kings-X" game which ended exactly that way—score, Nyssa 12, Burns 12.

The game proved three things to observers.

The Nyssa backfield, when spearheaded by Larry Schenk was a tough outfit to stop, the passing attack needs a lot of polishing and the line, though light, will put up a whale of a battle against any team.

At that Nyssa won all of the ballgame except the last five seconds when the Scots connected on a 12-yard pass into the end zone for the tying TD. An attempt to run the ball on the crucial try for points was smothered by the whole Bulldog team.

In the first half, with Schenk doing most of the carrying the Bulldogs had complete control of the ball. Chewing off huge hunks of yardage the team plowed down the field without giving up the ball. Schenk, Savage and Sanders alternated in moving the ball, aided by fine blocking went the distance in seven plays with Schenk scoring. The kick was wide.

Burns got hold of the ball twice during the first quarter but fumbled both chances away before they could get rolling.

In the second quarter the Bulldogs kept the pressure on. Burns, kicking deep in its own territory had the attempt blocked and Nyssa recovered the ball on the three yard line. Sanders bulled ahead for one yard and Schenk cut outside of left tackle to score the TD. A bad pass from center eliminated any chance to pick up an extra point.

Larry Schenk, star Nyssa back will be out for the season according to a Boise specialist. Schenk reinjured his right leg which he had previously injured in track. He may be able to play some basketball this winter. John Messick is expected to replace Schenk in the Bulldog backfield.

The third quarter started with a threat by the visitors. The Scots battled their way down the field to the Nyssa six yard line where a pass interception staved off a touchdown.

Now it was Burns that put on the pressure. Larry Schenk was out of the game due to a leg injury and his loss was felt on offense and defense.

Burns kicked out on the Nyssa 18 and the Bulldogs were unable to pick up a first down. On a fourth down kick, the Scots blocked the ball deep in Nyssa's territory. Peterlin picked up three yards, Smith was stopped, but on the next play the burns star went through for the TD. Try for point no good.

Nyssa took the ball on the kickoff and moved the ball to their own 43 where a fumble gave Burns possession of the ball with less than four minutes to play. Working smoothly the visitors bucked and passed their way down the field, calling timeout after each play as they neared paydirt. With five seconds left Burns uncorked a pass into the left corner of the end zone and

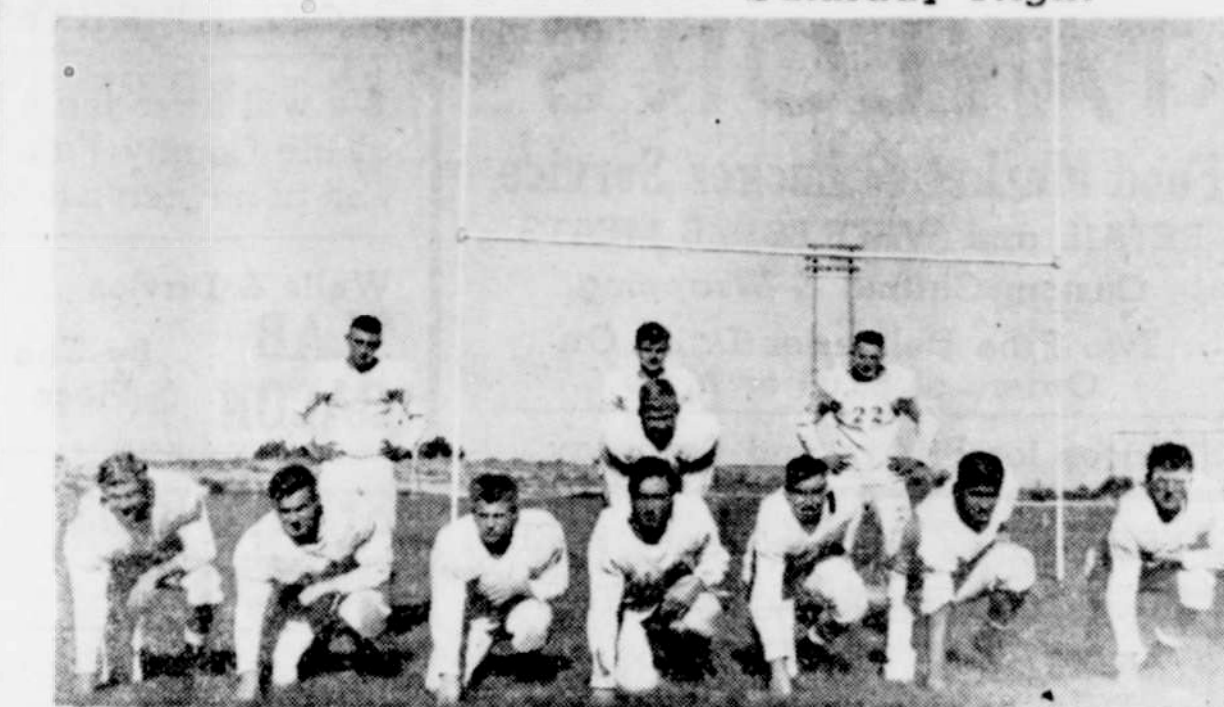
